

PARTE-SIFTON.

Hon. I. Tarte, Minister of Public Works in the Dominion Cabinet, has been speaking very freely of late in the direction of increased protection to some industries, by tariff increases, and at the same time deal a blow at the United States and Germany, who have been giving us rather shabby treatment on tariff lines.

Hon. Clifford Sifton, Minister of the Interior in the same cabinet, has spoken out once and plainly condemned any proposal to increase the tariff in the direction proposed as any increase of that kind would be to the detriment of the great Canadian consuming class, and especially the North-West farmer, fast becoming numerous.

Neither of them claims he is representing the government, each gives the other right of free speech, but the differences of view as aired to the public, seem impossible of reconciliation in the cabinet and one or the other must give way.

It is computed that increase of tariff would benefit 10 per cent of our population and injure a large part of the remaining 90 per cent. One side claims that prosperous industries make good markets for farmers, while the other claims that prosperous farmers are good for the industries.

It would require a greater than Mr. Tarte to prove that increased tariff that would injure, or at least not help 90 per cent of the population, is a good thing for the country. The attempt to talk of such at a time when farmers are prosperous, has given rise to the suspicion that manufacturers, also prosperous, think that a little more taken from the farmer, would not greatly injure him, leave him as good as he was when a little less prosperous, and prevent him from reveling too much in wealth.

We hope Mr. Tarte, the Liberal Government, the Liberal party and the country, will see that the good of the country requires, if changes are made at all, that they be made in the line of decreases, for the good of the greater number. The high tariff of the early 90's did not prevent the hard times in the middle of the decade, and certainly the lower tariff of 1897 and 1898 has not prevented more prosperous times. Let well enough alone.

D. McTayish, blacksmith, has purchased a tire setting machine. With this machine tires can be set without taking them off the wheel, the work being done in from eleven to fifteen minutes. The machine weighs two tons and cost \$210. It will be in operation next week. Any kind of a tire can be set by it, from a 2-inch to four inches.—Advance.

The remains of the late James Dyce, an Egremont pioneer, who died Monday at his daughter's in Beeton, were brought to town and the funeral took place yesterday from his son's residence, Fergus st., to the Woodland cemetery. Deceased would have been 90 years old on the 16th inst. and settled on the 12th of Egremont 41 years ago. He was a native of Aberdeen.—Mt Forest Rep.

The noon train on Tuesday was nearly two hours late owing to a rather unpleasant experience coming up the mountain. It was found impossible to pull the whole train and it was divided into two sections, one section remaining on the track while the other was taken to the top. On the engine's return it was unable to stop owing to a wet track and crashed into the coaches, giving the passengers a bad shaking up. Some who had their heads out of the windows got severe cuts and bruises by being pounded against the sash when the impact came.—Flesherton Advance.

THRESHING ACCIDENT.—Yesterday morning an accident of a very painful character took place on the farm of Wm. Evans, three miles from town. It appears that a young man, Will Mapletoft, was assisting Mr. Evans with his threshing. When the machine was being started in the morning, Mapletoft undertook to put the belt on one of the wheels. He had on threshing mitts at the time and one of his hands got caught between the belt and the wheel, which in revolving lifted the young man off his feet at every turn, twisting and smashing the forearm in a horrible manner. The machine was stopped as soon as possible but not till irreparable damage had been done. The poor fellow was released and the arm was found twisted like a rope, one of the bones being literally pulverized. A physician was at once sent for who amputated the arm a little below the elbow. The sufferer was soon after removed to his home and is doing as well as could be expected after his terrible experience.—Confederate.

Muir-Boyd—That Malcolm McDougall be refunded the township rate on the assessment of lots 10 S. D. R. and 11 N. D. R. on account of having his dwelling house burnt.—Carried.

Muir-Gibson—That the reeve and Mr. Thompson be paid \$2 each for committee work on township Artemesia and Osprey.—Carried.

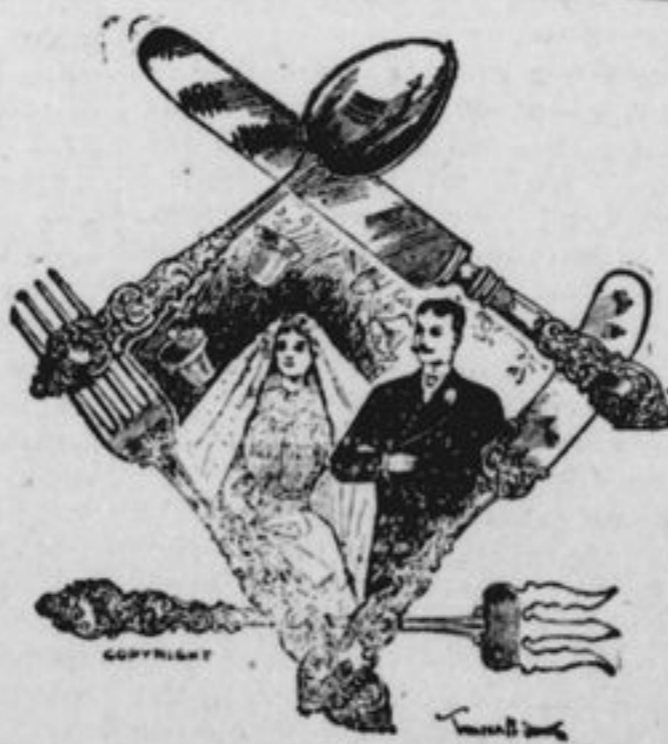
