AGRICULTURAL SHOW IN BRITAIN.

A private letter from Mr. W. A. MacKinnon, Chief of the Fruit Division, Dominion Dept. of Agriculture, who is now in Great Britain, contains some interesting notes on the development of agricultural shows in that country.

One striking feature of the recent Royal Show at Carlisle, Eng. was that all but two or three of the buildings were simply frames covered with canvas, in other words the Show took place under a series of long tents.

The tents are arranged in a compact and systematic order, in such a way that visitors can go in one direction and return in another seeing always new exhibits.

There are 4 classes of Agricultural shows in Great Britain:—(1) The large shows devoted to breeding types and implements: these are open to the Kingdom. (2) Local shows: for the benefit of tenant farmers and breeders in the neighborhood; there may be certain open competitions in these shows, and the addition of sections for horticulture, apiculture, sports, &c., is optional.

Another notable show is that called the Cart Horse Parade held in London, where prizes are given for the best single, pair, unicorn, and four horse teams; these must be working horses attached to vehicle without load.

NATIONAL PROSPERITY.

Last week we noted briefly the remarkable fact that the Post Office Department for the first time in its history had been run without a deficit.

And now comes this despatch from Ottawa which tells its own story: "The public accounts of the Dominion for the four months of the current year to the end of October show a net improvement in our finances over last year of something more than four millions of dollars.

For the month of October alone the showing is also most favorable. The revenue keeps on growing, but the outlay is comparatively less than it was a couple of years ago.

Other large expenditures the present government undertook are also complete, so that if the receipts continue to thrive there will doubtless be this year the best net surplus on record.

Live Stock Market Toronto.

Business was quiet at the Toronto Cattle Market to-day, but a steady tone prevailed and values were well maintained.

Export Cattle—Market is steady, with light offerings and a fair demand. The range of prices is unchanged, the best steers selling at \$5 per cwt.

Butchers' Cattle—Tops are good property, and they sell briskly, but the grades below the best are slow.

Feeders and Stockers—Short-keep feeders are very scarce and there is a steady inquiry for them; prices range as high as \$4.50 per cwt.

Milk Cows—Receipts were larger, and some first-class cows were on sale. They were soon snapped up, and prices ranged up to \$67 per head.

Calves—There is still a scarcity of good yearlings, and they are badly wanted. Prices are unchanged at \$3 to \$10 each.
