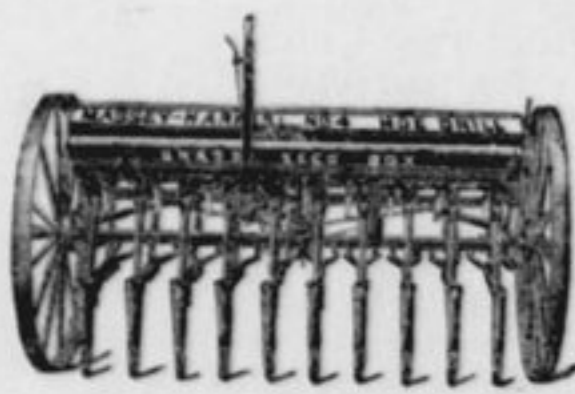

The Liquor Act, 1902.

all the Province can do. It bars all buying and selling in the province except as authorized by licenses under the law, it makes illegal all drinking anywhere except in a private house. It strikes direct at the bar room, and the shops and places where men may congregate.

How Enforced.

By the terms of the act regular inspectors are to be appointed whose duty it will be to inspect all licensed places where liquor is sold. They are also bound to enforce all the conditions of the act and to make examination in case any information is laid without disclosing the name of the informant. Every inspector, policeman or constable is authorized to enter any place, not a private dwelling, for the purpose of preventing or detecting the violation of the act, and with a warrant, he may enter any private dwelling house as well, for a like purpose.

How to Vote.

How then shall I vote? No one questions the greatness of the evil of drunkenness, well informed people assert that during the last four or five years there is a marked increase in drinking among women as well as men. The more before us may not cure all, but it is an honest effort to find some remedy. For ourselves we have no hesitation in saying we intend to mark a cross in the column under YES.

WHAT ABOUT DEC. 4TH.

There will be three kinds of voters on December 4th next. There is he who will go and vote "yes" forgetting for the moment the imperfections he may have seen in the Act, or its manner of submission in view of the fact that for the present this opportunity is the measure of temperance sentiment.

There is he who will boldly vote "nay" from personal motives of gain or loss or because he sees or thinks he sees some constitutional principle violated.

There is the other class: he who will stay at home, thinking he is neutral, a matter of no concern to him. There never was an election where this fallacy was so apparent as in this. With a vote of over 21000 to reach before there is even a chance of victory, the man who stays at home has his vote practically counted for him on the side of retaining the open bar and saloon.

Be sure then to record your vote. It is unmanly to stay at home. Vote against it if you must and be prepared to shoulder whatever of responsibility there may be in the vast train of evil that flows from the legalized traffic in strong drink as a beverage.

The voter who considers the loss to the nation in impaired industry alone by the destruction of the earning power of men who spend their means and their time at the bar or in the saloon, will not require to hear the wail of the wife or mother pleading him to mark his ballot in favor, for their sake. We said "destruction of earning power," every voter knows it does that and more, it blights homes, it wrecks bright facilities, it increases the amount of human misery, and destroys life itself.

The voter who votes Nay on Dec. 4th, is a partner with the traffic that produces these results, for no evil that produces the saloon banished, can equal that produced by the saloon active. Everyone vote anyway and let us know the truth.

At the Asylums for the Insane in Toronto, London, Kingston, Hamilton, Mimico, Brockville, Colborne and Orillia; the Central Prison and Mercer Reformatory, Toronto; the Reformatory for Boys, Penitentiaries: the Institutions for Deaf and Dumb, Belleville, and the Blind at Stratford.

Exception—Tenders are not required for the supply of meat to the asylums in Toronto, London, Kingston, Hamilton, and Brockville, nor for the Central Prison and Mercer Reformatory, Toronto. A marked cheque for five per cent. of the estimated amount of the contract payable to the order of the Honorable the Provincial Secretary, must be furnished by each tenderer as a guarantee of his bona fides. Two sufficient copies will be required for the due fulfillment of each contract, and should any tender be withdrawn before the contract is awarded, or should the tenderer fail to furnish such security, the amount of the deposit will be forfeited.
