

We have been furnished with the minutes of the meeting held at Walker-Mrs. Hampton of Holland Centre was | ton on Dec. 5, to consider the desirability of taking steps to have the charter of this electric road extended, the expiry taking place April, 26, 1903. To renew the charter will take \$500, half of which is paid by the Western Section, Durham to Kincardine. Mr. A. Shaw. K. C. explained the reasons for calling the meeting, which is embodied in the above. Following is the minutes:
