## COUNTY COUNCIL NOMINATIONS

A Contest in No. 3 Division.

The result of the Nominations in Durham is that the two present members Chas McKinnon and Duncan McLean have to contest the Division with another "Mc"—Neil McCanuel of S Glenelg, who has had several years experience of public life in his own township.

Warden McKinnon gave a long and exhaustive account of County work, accounts, etc., especially dealing with the House of Refuge which he at one time opposed, but, on closer acquaintance, now favored. He gave his reasons for change of opinion and narrated the steps taken by the council to select site. He also laid stress upon the fact that a surplus of \$8000 existed in the county as the result of economical management, and that all engagements were promptly met.

Mr McLean followed and touched briefly and lucidly on some of the points dealt with more exhaustively by his colleague.

Mr McCanuel then placed himself before the electors, having consented to the request of many friends to stand for the position. In his brief address he gave reasons for his candidature in the warding of County Council matters but left his fate in the hands of the electors.

The attendance was very small betokening little interest, which may or may not be evidence of satisfaction with things as they are.

There seems little to criticize. Some complaint of giving \$3000 for a 50 acre farm, for selecting Thibodeau's and then going back to Marsh's, but Mr McKinnon seemed fortified at every point. However the contest is on and Jan. 5th must decide.

Division No. 4.

Here a "Presto change" took place, which came as a surprise, but did affect the expected result of an election by acclamation. Mr. Andrew Schenck resigned on the eve of nomination and his father stepped into the breach so that George instead of Andrew reigns dually with Jas. Allan for the next two years in No. 4. Mr. Schenck, Sr. was a County councillor in the old days.

John McArthur and S. Bell are elected for Division No. 5. We have nothing from the other divisions.

Brief addresses were given by Rev. Messrs Ryan and Farquharson, and by Messrs Campbell Allan and Ramage, all appreciative of the excellent work and character of Miss Anderson as a teacher and townswoman, regretting to lose her but wishing her a bright future. "God Save The King" closed the meeting and Miss Anderson had a long and tender leave-taking from pupils, ex-pupils and friends present. Following is the address:
