\*\*\*\*\* The following is a synopsis of an address delivered by Dr. J. Hugo keed, one of the expert judges employed by this department at the recent Charlottetown Fair.

If a man is breeding for the market he should find out what the market demands and then make up his mind as to what style of the horses in demand he can produce at most profit to himself. The best selling horses to-day are heavy draughts, carriage horses and saddle

Prince Edward 'sland is certainly in a position to produce good neavy norses. The Clydes are a good breed and seem to be in most demand. The stallions at present owned on the island when mated to good mares will certainly produce colts that will seil well. A reasonably heavy mare of good conformation is required. There were instances on the grounds where Clyde stallions had been bred to light mares of standard bred blood. The progeny were nondescripts of no particular use, and this is the general result of such violent crossing.

The distinction between carriage horses and roadsters is evidently not well understood by exhibition managements or people in the Maritime Provinces. Taese are two distinet types of horses, and should not be judged in the same class. There should be provision at least for a single roadster in harness and a matened pair.

The distinction between Roadsters and carriage horses is not a matter of size, or of breeding. The road horse is valuable for his performance in getting over the road; the carriage horse for his attractiveness, his style and action, in addition horse in demand to-day must have action, high action, folding his knees and hocks well, and he must do this no matter whether going five miles an hour or lifteen. He must hold up his head without the aid of a check, and always look proud. In size he may vary from 15.2 hands to 16 hands or even slightly

over. As a general rule the carriage horse should have more substance than the roadster, be more horizontal in the croup, and above all must have a high, proud head. The road horse with low action and perhaps low head may go laster and farther and last longer than the carriage horset but he is not so much in demand. In the large markets, Chicago, New York, Detroit and even Toronto, the carriage horse may sell for from \$600 up, while the road borse will bring from \$150 up.

It is the influence of thoroughbred blood that has produced the standard bred trotter of to-day. It is his thoroughbred ancestry which gives him his

coruage and endurance. Saddle Horses .- As above indicated, saddlers can best be got by the use of a thoroughbred stallion. Mares of strong conformation should be chosen. Strength of loin and quarter is an all-important nacessity in a saddler. A good general purpose mare can be used and will give saddle horses for heavy weight riding more surely than mares of finer breeding. Good saddlers are perhaps the most difficult horses to-day to buy and they will | riage horse.

General Principles .- Whatever line of breeding a man may follow he must have a definite object and know what he is doing. There are now on the island a good many mares that would mate well with the thoroughbred and hackney or coach stallions. I would not use a coarse or cold blooded mare, but would endeavor to get one with standard bred or other warm blood. As a general rule, a good driving mare will cross well with a hackney. If Government inspection of horses, such as is carried on in Quebec, could be carried out free from political intrigue, it would be a good thing in any country. ; The horsemen have, however, the whole question in their own hands; the scrub stallion only exists because he is patronized. If breeders demand pure-bred stallions the scrub will have to go out of business. Some farmers seem to think that because they have not got a choice mare, it is not worth while to pay from \$10 to \$15 fee for a good stallion, but they take a scrub at from \$4 to \$8. This is a great mistake; if a mare is worth breeding att all, she is worth breeding to the best stallion procurable. The great need of the horse business is more intelligence and enterprise among the horsemen rather than Government regulations.

VICTORIA REINCARNATED.

Strange Story Circulated by Buddhist Priests in Burmah. The "Times of India" tells a pretty

story about the Burmese belief in the transmigration of the soul of the late Queen Victoria. It is well known that nowhere is the memory of that Sovereign more deeply cherished than in Burma, and in her life that reverence was most marked in many ways. Few, however, imagined that there was anything in it more than the loyalty which most of the oriental nations under British sway exhibit. But according to marked demonstrations of regard for the Queen. The Times of India says: Since her death the story has grown up, and is now told seriously to their disciples by Buddhist priests in Burmese monasteries, that in the transmigration of souls, in which the Buddhists believe Queen Victoria was once a Burmese maiden. In the beginning of the nineteenth century, they say, there was born in Rangoon a daughter to a poor Burmese couple. The pair were hawkers by trade, and their daughter helped them to sell fried and boiled peas in the street. She became known throughout Rangoon for her plety and gentleness, and when she died Gautama Buddha granted her prayer that she should be born again where she could do the maximum of good to her fellow beings, and her soul passed into the cradle of the infant Victoria.
