DIRE DISASTER.

The most appalling railway disaster that has occurred in Canada for many years, took place last Saturday at 10 p. m., in a cold night and raging snow storm. A heavy G. T. R. passenger train, while running at the rate of 48 miles an hour, smashed head first into a freight, at Wanstead, a small station about 48 miles west of London, with the result that 28 were killed, and more than that number injured. A jury is trying to fix the blame, which seems to be divided among 4 or 5 different operators and dispatchers, with the company culpable to some extent by overworking employees. Mr and Mrs W. H. Cole, Flint, Mich., known in Durham, are among the injured. The horrors of the accident are indescribable.
