# THE CROWN PRINCESS FLEES FROM SAXONY

# Strange Disappearance of the Makes a Hit in a New Play Before Wife of the Crown Prince.

Left During a Ball and Slipped Away --- All Europe Hunting for Her--- Flee From Her Home at Salzburg After Midnight Dec. 12 and Has Left No Trace Behind-Rumored Domestic Discord - Left Dummy in Bed.

her home during the night of December 11-12. The Dresdener Journal to-day says:

"The Princess, in a state of intense mental excitement, suddenly deserted her family at Salzburg and went abroad. The Saxon court functions for the winter, including the New Year's reception, have been canceled."

The foregoing paragraph in today's official journal, which was inserted by order of the King and Crown Prince, has turned into truth what for several days past has been regarded as an incredible tale. The Crown Princess, surrounded by her ladies-in-waiting and numerous attendants and servants of the Royal household, has vanished so utterly that the police of every kingdom of Europe have for ten days been unable to trace her. The official announcement was made in order to obtain the aid of the general public in finding the Princess, and because the court fiction that she preferred to remain in retirement at Salzburg rather than to return to her husband and children at Dresden, cannot longer be maintained.

Developed Eccentricities. Accompanied by the Crown Prince, the Princess went to the castle of Emperor Francis Joseph, near Salzburg, a month ago. A week after their arrival the Prince broke his leg while hunting, and was brought back to Dresden. The Princess, however, still remained at the castle. Why she did so the people of the court did not know, except that the Princess, with gloomy tenacity, usually does what she wants. For a little while this explanation sufficed; then fragments of gossip began to reach Dresden. It was said that the Princess had surrendered herself to periods of nervous excitement, and that her eccentricities of her suite, and to some of her Aus-

Shocking Tragedy on a Farm in Middleport.

Wesley Watson Comes Home From Detroit to Spend Christmas-His Brothers Thinking He Was a Burglar Ran Off-Came Back and Shot Down.

Brantford despatch : As already reported, Wesley Watson, aged 25, was shot and instantly killed by his broat 9 o'clock this morning, being mis-

The scene of the shocking tragedy lonely part of the township, some distance off the main road. The Watson brothers, who are bachelors, had their mother as bousekeeper for them, while the other brother, Wesley Watson, was supposed to be in Detroit, where he was employed. Some days ago the mother left to pay a visit to some friends in another part of the township, leaving the bachelor brothers to keep house.

Returned Unannounced. After dark last night the younger brother returned mannounced and. unexpectedly from Detroit, and went to the farm house after the elder brothers had retired for the night. Some time after retiring they heard somebody about the premises, and subsequently an entrance was made to the rooms downstairs. The two brothers, who are of rather a timid nature, immediately supposed they were the victims of a burglary, and gathering a few articles of clothing. they made their escape out of a bedroom window and fled to the house of a neighboring farmer, Mr. Dougherty, where they reported that their house had been entered by burglars, for the night. Accommodation was provided for them, and they remained until after daylight this morning. Shortly before 9 o'clock they repaired to their own home, armed with a shotgun, and upon entering the premises downstairs saw that someone gun they proceeded to make an in-

Shot as He Lay in Bed.

Upon going upctairs to one of the bedrooms they found one of the doors half open, and the form of a man lying in bed.
