Town Council.

The first meeting of the new council was held Monday Mayor McIntyre in the chair and beginning on his right round the table (much too long) sat Councillors, J. L. Browne, Wm. Sharp, A. S. Hunter, John McKechnie, John H. Brown, Alex. McLauchlan, with clerk W. B. Vollett at the Mayor's left.

Now about that table. It was made for days when councils were bigger and there is a sense of emptiness to see so many gaps, or else all bunched round one end and the mayor and clerk at the other. To remedy this we suggest a "saw off" or, better, let a little table be supplied to each of the councillors and placed as far apart inside the rail as possible, the mayor and clerk being on a raised dais. This would necessitate speaking in a higher key but the public would appreciate it and we can't see that it would hinder business.

Mr. Jas. Carson is no longer Constable. He resigned the position and Mr. T. Whelan, the only applicant, gets the plum if such it is. For many years the name Constable Carson has carried terror to the small boy with a sleigh on the hill, and to evil doers in particular. He has been a faithful official and has been true to his ideal of duty. Mr. Whelan has experience in this line and will make an efficient officer. R. Aljoe, sr., is truant officer, C. Elvidge, Assessor, Jas. Davidson, Caretaker, T. Daniels, Pound Keeper, Auditors, W. S. Davidson and Arch. Davidson, Fence Viewers: E. Ward, J. Carwardine; W. Ward, Jas. Falkingham; N. Ward, Jas. Davidson. Dr. J. G. Hutton is medical Health officer. B. Warner health Inspector.

This last was the only post with two applicants and necessitated a vote. It stood three and three and chairman McKechnie gave it to B. F. Warner, the other applicant being Hugh Mackay.

Unless the statute of 1899, Chap. 26, Sec. 19, subsection 2 is repealed the use of the ballot is a violation of law. The Statute says: Whenever a division is taken upon the appointment of an officer of the corporation, each member of the council present voting shall announce his vote openly and individually in the council and the clerk shall record the same; and no vote shall be taken by ballot or by any other method of secret voting, etc. We think the statute is all right and should be honored by observance.

A large number of aecs., amounting to over \$200, were ordered paid.

Clerk Vollett has kindly furnished us with full minutes. We omit the items mentioned above.

The council met according to statute at 11 a.m. in the council chamber, made the declaration and qualification of office. All were present except A. S. Hunter who took the declarations at 8 p.m. to which time the council adjourned.

John McKechnie, A. McLauchlan and J. H. Brown were appointed distribution committee and the council resolved while they fix on the Standing committees as follows:

The Accounts of the Royal artificial paving Co., and of Mr Carwardine were laid over. McLauchlan-Brown—that the clerk's salary be increased \$25.—Carried.
On motion the Board of works was instructed to advertise for tenders for clearing snow off the granolithic sidewalk walks and wooden walks approaching bridges.
The Mayor was instructed by council to have a by-law drafted, appointing an Inspector for wood and all other articles offered for sale in town, as there are several complaints as regards wood offered for sale.
Salaries are as follows: Truant officer \$5, Assessor \$50, Health Insp. \$25, Med. Health officer \$5, Pound keeper \$3, Constable \$100, Caretaker \$15, Auditors \$15 each, Clerk \$25.
