Spinsters in the United Sates. The fate of the unsophisticated man who declared in a public address that there were "100,000 superfluous women in Massachusetts" has never been definitely ascertained. It is known, however, that this was his concluding public declaration on that subject.

Without the fear of his fate, another computer came forward recently to declare that the proportion of unmarried girls and women was increasing. As a matter of fact it is steadily diminishing in the United States, and, as a veteran advocate of the extension of the legal rights of women has pointed out, there are now in the United States 2,500,000 more single men of marriageable age than there are single women, the official figures being as follows: Unmarried men. 10.448,-153; unmarried girls and women,
