Sales passed off at the Western Cattle Market to day with a moderate amount of yim in exporters' cattle, but the prices were every bit as weak as before. Sheep continued in steady demand, with an upward tendency. In hogs there was no quotable change but the prices were weak, and it looked as if they would go lower. Good yeal calves were still wanted.

Export Cattle-Sales in these passed off without any quotable decline, but there was still a weak tone to the market. Extra choice exporters, 1,250 to 1,200 lbs. each, were worth \$4.75 to \$5.35, and medium and light shippers \$4.40 to 4.70

Butchers' cattle-An easier feeling predominated in the market, but previous values were maintained. A lot of choice butchers'. 1,100 to 1,800 lbs. each, brought \$4.50. Light to heavy butchers,' of 800 to 1,300 lbs., sold for \$3.25 to \$4.25 per 100 lbs. A number of 1,000 lb., stock was disposed of at \$4.
