Baptist Continuation Services.

Sunday last was again a red-letter day in Baptist circles for they had with them Dr. Spencer, Brantford, who saw the laying of the corner stone and who was rejoiced with the pastor and people on the completion of the handsome edifice. Rev. Wray B. Smith addressed the congregation in the afternoon, Dr. Spencer, morning and evening. At the latter service once more Church and school-room were too small for the congregation and some stood through the service, which was devoutly attractive. Rev. Mr. Stewart was at this service and again gave the opening prayer.

The evening discourse was founded on Paul's ringing words to Timothy, "I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ." He dwelt especially (1) on Paul's courage though often in trouble. God's people were always a suffering people and he made this a plea for harmony in the churches for there would always be trouble enough from an outside. (2) On Paul's knowledge. "I know." It was good for a man to know and to know that he knows. Paul said I know "whom" not "what." "Know that you are lost, that Jesus died to save, that you are that very sinner for whom Christ died." An assent to the historical Christ is not belief in him. (3) On Paul's Assurance. He was "persuaded," Christ was not only the Saviour of his disciples, he was also their Keeper. Paul made a surrender. "I have committed." Impressively he asked all to allow Christ to hold them, not to trust to their own holding on. Put your hand in God's, he is able to keep you. The light and comfort from these five statements from Paul should shine in the home, in business, &c.

He made a stirring appeal to non-Christians to decide the great question. Death-bed repentances were often not sincere. Take hold of him in health and strength and "now" and have the blessed experience of the apostle.

The Concert.

Monday evening the Auditorium was full on the occasion of the Concert. Owing to illness the expected musical artist, Mr. F. Davidson, was prevented from coming, but we are sure that had he been present no more satisfied audience could have left the church. Dr. Spencer can sing as well as preach and the enthusiasm with which his efforts were received must have been almost embarrassing to him. Dr. Brown of Holstein, was, of course, a host in himself and his numbers were heartily encored, while Mrs. Newton both at the organ and vocally contributed a very The recitative by Mrs. Newton, Miss A. Brown, and Mr. Alex. Bell was an attractive number, and the choir excelled itself.

**THE CEMENT WORKS INVADED.**

**HUNDREDS OF SIGHT-SEERS.**

Thursday last a special excursion train was run from Toronto here, stopping at Guelph and Palmerston to pick up stockholders in The National Portland Cement Co. The train arrived about 11.30 and about 350 passengers were unloaded in the grounds near the machine shop, and had their first view of the works on rather a depressing day, a slight rain falling and muddy in places under foot.

The party were met by the Mayor and Council, Dr. Jamieson, M. P. P., and other lights of the town, but the absence of any platform or quiet place for an assemblage prevented any formal welcome of an address and reply kind. However, Dr. Jamieson, representing Mayor, Council, the Cement Co. and himself, spoke a few words of welcome to the visitors and gave them the freedom of the works.

Then commenced an examination of the mysteries of a Cement plant. Engineer Bogardus led the way, and began with the clay department. As many as possible got within sound of his voice, but the greater number had to be content with sight seeing or stray questions from town folks who mingled with them.

Every eye and ear was greedy for information, and certainly there was abundance to see in the most up-to-date cement plant in the world. Beginning with the clay drying rotary, almost under and adjoining the 60 ft. high trestle bridge, the visitors were conducted through the electric lift tunnel under the capacious clay store-house, on each side of them seeing the conveyors which take the clay to the "Pug Mills" where it undergoes other processes in the way of the friend, the Marl. Emerging from the tunnel the raw visitor sees an overwhelming maze of Rotaries, Motors, Tanks, Wheels, Belts etc., and unless of a mechanical turn of mind, he at once yields to the conviction that he is going to be hopelessly lost in getting a grasp of the big machine, for though in many buildings, the whole outfit is practically a machine.

However he goes along boldly, picking his way up and down steps, getting around a belt or two, wondering perhaps if the big crowd is going to escape without accident. Presently before him looms the 8 vast tanks into which passes the mixture of clay and marl, before passing to the fire. Up a stairway to a platform and he looks down into the mixture bubbling and boiling as a result of compressed air driven through. He learns that before leaving these tanks a chemical test is made in the Laboratory to make sure there is the proper proportion to make the best cement in the world. Down again to terra firma or rather to the brick and cement floor of the vast rotary building, for before him now lie the 8 monster rotaries 70 feet long, four of them lazily turning without a jar on their vast bearings, which rest on cement concrete as solid as the earth itself. A look at the higher end shows the slush mixture dripping in and meeting the flames from the lower end. This end is the popular view point, through colored glasses, the dried coal dust making a blaze to beat Nebuchadnezzar's furnace, 7 times heated, and leading the joker to point out "your future home."

The red hot clinkers find their way into iron buckets, an endless chain, floating in water for over 100 yards and then climbing to the roof return again for more, after meeting the trip which unloads them into the "grinders," or into the "clinker storage" building from which it is again automatically fed into the buckets.

Time and space forbid to tell of the Krupp mills, the vast warehouse with its facilities for packing and loading, the powerhouse with its wonderful machinery, electric and otherwise, the vast boilers and unique method of feeding, &c., &c.

By this time the crowd is sighing for the lake, for they have been told its level is 100 feet above the smoke stack which giant towers up 180 feet without a guy wire.

The four vestibuled coaches were crammed from end to end hundreds of citizens having now joined the party. The Company's engine is attached behind, and after two attempts succeeded in getting up the cut grade, and went rattling to the lake.

Here a large number went across to the dredge and witnessed Mr. Fleming manipulate his big spoon with marvellous ease and accuracy. Time was short however, and return was soon made to the works where all Toronto travellers were picked up and the run made to Toronto, getting there about 8.30 p. m. They settled down to supper and then to business, the first meeting of the stock holders of the N. P. C. Co., breaking up harmoniously about 2.00 a. m.
