A VICTORY FOR PROVINCE.

Ontario Entitled to License International Ferries. Toronto report; A decision an-

nounced yesterday by Mr. Justice Street forms another victory for Provincial as opposed to Dominion jurisdiction, the question at issue being the right to grant franchises for the operation of ferries from a Provincial point to a foreign country. The particular case came from Sault Ste. Marie, the plaintiff being Mr. R. D. Perry, of Toronto, and the defendants the Algoma Central Railway Company and Mr. F. H. Clergue. Mr. Perry had been operating a ferry between Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., and Sault Ste.
