WEATHER.—The opening days of February were exceedingly mild, agreeable in the main, with the predictions of Rev. I. R. Hicks, the weather man of St. Louis, and this must have roused public interest in his forecasts especially as he has laid out for a very rough February. The most striking hits he made were the tidal wave which destroyed Galveston, the famous advice in 1901—"Sow crops that will ripen with early rains," meaning a dry summer, and the Mt. Pelee disaster in 1902. Predicting for a continent is pretty safe work as a storm is sure to exist somewhere, but he occasionally has localized it, till now his successes cause comment and his failures are overlooked. The violent snowstorm of Sunday and Monday has given away again to thawing weather. Hicks says "A storm period to watch is from about Sunday the 8th to Thursday the 12th, the days of greatest violence being on and touching the 10th and 11th. Those who do not prepare for hard winter storms and for a great cold wave and blizzard between the 9th and 16th February, will, we fear pay a costly penalty." As we write on the 11th it is extremely mild and starting to snow again.

THE LICENSE QUESTION.

At the special meeting on Monday night to consider the advisability of increasing the License fees on hotels, making them more liberal contributors to the revenues of the town, the question was shelved in the meantime. The motion was defeated by the casting vote of the Mayor, the members of council dividing as follows:

This result, while no doubt gratifying to the parties concerned, does not we think represent the sentiment of the town on the question, and the spirit that prompted the rolling up of a majority of 94 for the Referendum, has been clearly ignored by the majority.
