The official statement of the referendum vote on the liquor act on Dec. 4 has been made by the Clerk of the Legislature. The figures show that 190,749 votes were cast in favor of the act, and 103,512 against, giving a majority in favor of 96,207. The number of names on the voters' list was 598,634, which therefore shows that the votes favorable were 33.4 per cent of the total on the list.

In the evening there was a union meeting in the Town Hall. Mrs. Campbell addressed the meeting on the "Four Cardinal points of Home Dairying" and was listened to with great interest.

Quite a number of members were secured at both the evening and afternoon meetings.

THE LICENSE LAW IGNORED.

Warton hotelmen have passed a resolution whereby they agree to close their bars and liquor cellars from 7 o'clock on Monday morning.

The foregoing item has appeared in several of our exchanges without comment. By this action the hotel men in question tacitly admit they have not been observing the law in the past, and are going to do by voluntary agreement what was supposed to be done by legal compulsion. If this is not making a laughing stock of a serious and important regulation we don't know what is, and it would be interesting to know how many towns and cities are better or worse than Warton in this respect. There is surely room for the advanced restriction expected at the coming session, and if it took to enforce the law as we have it, it seems good could be accomplished. The Warton hotel-keepers have let light on the subject.

CHOICE GRAIN FOR SEED.

To the Editor of the Durham Review:—Dear Sir:—By instruction of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture another sample of the most productive sorts of grain to Canadian farmers for the improvement of seed. The stock for distribution is of the very best and has been secured by the Director of the Experimental Farms from the excellent crops recently had in the Canadian North-west. The distribution of this spring will consist of samples of Oats, Spring wheat, Barley, Indian corn and Potatoes. The quantities of oats, wheat and barley to be sent this year will be sufficient to sow one twentieth of an acre. The samples of Indian corn and Potatoes will weigh 3 lbs as heretofore. Every farmer may apply, but only one sample can be sent to each applicant, hence if an individual receives a sample of oats he cannot also receive one of wheat, barley or potatoes, and applications for more than one sample for one household cannot be entertained. These samples will be sent free of charge through the mail.

Applications should be addressed to the "Director of Experimental Farms, Ottawa," and may be sent in any time before the 1st of March, after which the lists will be closed so that all samples asked for may be sent out in good time for sowing. Parties writing should mention the sort of variety they would prefer, and should the available stock of the kind asked for be exhausted, some other good sort will be sent in its place. Wm. SAUNDERS,

The Death Roll.

Mr. Alex. McComb.

The late Alex. McComb, whose death we announced last week, was buried on Friday, in Trinity Church cemetery, many old friends and neighbors paying their last tribute of respect. Rev. Mr. Newton conducted a funeral service in the church and also at the residence on Halton Co. They moved to Bunesan in 1880 and for the last 20 years have resided in Durham. The chief mourners are his widow, two sons, Thos. and Samuel McComb Bunesan, and one daughter, Mrs. Allan McKinnon. The only other blood relative in this country is a nephew, Mr. Henry McLaren, Toronto. Four brothers are still in Belfast, Wm. a shipping merchant, Thos. a bank manager, Archie, farmer, Samuel, a merchant. Mr. McComb for some years has been somewhat infirm, but previously he took an active interest in public affairs and for a while sat in Durham council. Many of his Bunesan neighbors of the older times speak in warm terms of the deceased as a neighbor and friend. In politics, he was conservative, and was a prominent member of the Baptist church. Attending the funeral from a distance were Mr. Thos. McComb, Williamsford and Mr. Sam McComb, Palmerton, brothers of Mr. McComb, and Mr. Andrew Brown, Mt. Forest, a brother-in-law. Mr. Arch. McKinnon of Toronto, a grandson, and Mrs. Martin, Williamsford, daughter of Mr. T. McComb, were also present.

Mrs. Duncan McIntyre.

On Friday last there died near Bunesan, one of the oldest of the residents of that neighborhood in the person of Mrs. D. McIntyre, mother of Mayor McIntyre, of town. Though not strong for years she was able to be about till a few days before her death when she was attacked with a heart trouble which carried her off at the ripe age of 86. Deceased was a native of Uist, Invernesshire, Scotland and came to Canada with her husband in 1818 settling first in Nichol, near Guelph, and in 1851 they moved to "the bush" to the 2nd Con. N. D. R. Glenora, where she died. She was the oldest of a family of nine, only two of whom survive her, Mr. Hugh McLellan, near by and Archie in Detroit. Of her own family four sons and three daughters remain, her husband having died 2 years ago. The sons are Norman in town, Angus in New Mexico, Archie in Michigan, and Donald on the homestead. Mrs. Angus Patterson, Flint, Mich., Mrs. McComb, her nephews, Allister and Shirley McIntyre, the funeral service will be preached at the Baptist church near her old home on Sunday morning, Feb. 22nd. The family desire us to express their thanks to neighbors and friends for many kindly attentions during the last days.

Mr. Thos. Brown.

The grim messenger, Death, is very busy at this season and the town was saddened Tuesday morning to learn that the night watchman, Mr. Thos. Brown had been called away. This result has been expected for some time, as all attempts to ward off his disease were seen to be only partially successful, yet the realization of his loss falls heavy on his townsmen, who have recognized his public spirit and usefulness, and regret their cutting off. Mr. Brown was the eldest son of Mr. James Brown, one of the earliest pioneers, and almost the only one remaining of the first municipal officials of this part of the country. The deceased was a man of great intelligence, well read, and had he aimed that way might have been in public life continually. For a year or two he was honored with the mayoralty of the town, but perhaps the shadow of a waning vitality, led him to retirement and he conducted some most successful work in pisciculture, and fowl raising and especially will be missed as Secretary of the Horticultural Society in which he took a great interest. His widow, aged father, brother and other relatives, sympathy is extended over the loss of one who will long be remembered for his upright character, urbane qualities and public usefulness. The funeral takes place Wednesday, to the family burying ground at Holstein, under the auspices of the Masonic order, of which body he was an honored member.
