MEMORANDUM FROM THE EDUCATION DEPARTMENT.

As announced in the public press in June, 1902, the change in the length of the session of the Provincial Normal Schools will take effect in September, 1903. Hereafter the session will extend from the second Tuesday in September in each year to the third Friday in June of the year following, and will consist of two terms. The first term will begin on the second Tuesday in September and end on the eighteenth day of December of the same year. The second term of the session will begin on the seventh day of January of the following year and end on the third Friday in June next following.

Any teacher who has at least Junior Leaving standing and who has taught a public school successfully for one year, or who after passing the County Model School examination has taught for six months under the supervision of the Inspector of a city having a City Model School, or any person qualified for admission to the Ontario Normal College, may be admitted as a Normal School student, but every applicant for admission shall be required to produce a medical certificate of freedom from serious pulmonary affections and from seriously defective eyesight and hearing, and also a certificate of good moral character.

Application for admission, accompanied with the above mentioned certificates is to be made to the Deputy Minister on or before the first day of September preceding the session to which admission is desired. The fee for the session is ten dollars (\$10.00), and is to be paid when application for admission is made.

A calendar outlining the course of study and the requirements for graduation will be issued at an early date. EDUCATION DEPARTMENT, February 3rd 1903.

Presbyterian Social.

Rev. Mr. Farquharson Honored.

Thursday evening of last week the adjourned Annual Meeting of the Presbyterian church was held, and a large number from town and country were present. Tea was served from 6 to 8, and a very pleasant social time was spent round comfortable new folding tables just secured. We may dispose of this at once by admitting its excellence and abundance, for the evening following a gathering of the children was held to enjoy the untouching portion of the offerings.

Adjournment was made upstairs, and a few reports were soon disposed of. It was announced that the debt incurred for improvements, amounting to about \$4,000, was all provided for but about \$50, and the extinction of that was quite in sight. The congregation, now released from this activity contemplates at once making provision for a manse, this being almost the only congregation in the Presbytery, not so supplied, a fact only recently brought to their attention.

Business was not the spirit of the meeting however, for the social hours seemed to demand something musical to follow. The choir had made special preparations and in addition to their excellent pieces, solos were given by Mrs Buchan, Mrs Fran's Livingstone, Dr Hutton and J. P. Telford. A duet was given by Mrs A. Jackson and Miss Burnet, and two recitations by W. S. Davidson in his own spirited way taught good lessons in a humorous manner. These were all much enjoyed, and the congregation were delighted to welcome for the first time from among themselves such able entertainers as Mrs Livingstone and Dr Hutton.

The event of the evening however was the address to Rev. Wm. Farquharson, given below, which was, at the request of the ladies, read by Mr N. W. Campbell, while the presentation was made by Mrs Jno. Cameron. The offering was a free-will gift of \$100 which had been worked up by the ladies and came as a complete surprise to the recipient. Mr Farquharson in his reply, though embarrassed, acknowledged their generosity having made kindly reference to Mrs Farquharson, he paid a high compliment to her as a worthy helpmeet and inspiration to him in his work. The applause which greeted his reply was an index of the warmth of feeling held by the congregation to their pastor and his worthy wife.

Messrs. Wm. Young, T. McGillivray, T. Allan and N. W. Campbell were in turn called upon and each responded in an appropriate way. The first named made an effective speech, pointing out avenues of usefulness, not only for the church, but for the town as a town, and especially commending the work of the Public Library.

Following is the address:

ADDRESS. Dear Mr. Farquharson:— It is with mingled feelings of pleasure and satisfaction that we look back upon the three years we have spent together as Pastor and People.

That our church has made progress we cannot doubt, and that much of that progress is, under Providence, directly due to your wise leadership as pastor we freely and willingly affirm. Our belief, have been wisely directed. Our Annual Reports show a gratifying increase in our membership and a steady gain in the several departments of our church work. While we deplore how little we have done to assist you in your work, how indifferent and apathetic we have at times appeared, yet we believe and trust that the spiritual results though not so obvious to mortal eyes, have found favor with the great Head of the Church.

As our pastor, you have always been ready to assist us in every proper undertaking, to sympathize with us in our troubles and sorrows and to minister to our spiritual needs in every legitimate way. As a citizen, you have taken an active interest in the secular affairs of our town, and assisted in every honorable way, all efforts to promote a purer morality and a truer citizenship.

To Mrs Farquharson, we are bound to add, you owe much of your success, and we desire to couple her name with yours in all our expressions of commendation, as she herself is already in the affections of our hearts.
