### PREBYTERY NOTES.

The Presbytery of Saugeen met on Tuesday at Mt. Forest. Rev. Mr. Aull, the moderator, elect in the chair. On motion of Rev. Mr. Hanna, Prof. McComb, of Queen's was nominated a successor to Dr. Gordon in Halifax College. Since Dr. Gordon left Halifax College to be principal of Queen's the nomination is on the principle that fair exchange is no robbery. As Mr. Brown's term of appointment as ordained missionary in Cedarville has expired the Presbytery commended him to the Home Mission committee for further appointment and arranged to secure further supply for Cedarville beginning with April 1st. Mr. Stevenson was examined and received as a student having in view the Presbyterian Ministry.

The surprise of the day was the eagerness with which Commissions to the General Assembly were grasped at. The general impression was that owing to the great distance to the meeting place at Vancouver and the consequent expense, commissions would go a-begging; but instead of that there is every likelihood that twice as many will go from the Presbytery as there are commissions. The fortunate ones to whom the rotation gives the place for the present year are Revs. Edmison, D. Olson and Tate and probably all these will go. Presbytery adjourned to meet at Holstein on the first Tuesday of July.

### THE BYE-ELECTIONS.

N. York, Liberal. Centre Bruce Conservative.

The result of last Thursday's elections in North York and Centre Bruce, was one for each of the parties. Hon. Mr. Davis defeated Mr. Lennox by twice the majority of the general election. Mr. Lennox even having a reduced vote in his own town. The result seems to be a condemnation of Mr. Lennox' attitude, he refusing to discuss public questions, but continually harping on protests and irregularities and on personal matters. Mr. Davis has been loyally sustained, the government has been strengthened, and we hope no opportunity has been given to point to one irregular or dishonest action.

Mr. Clark, Centre Bruce, has increased his majority from 5 to 53, and this will no doubt be accepted as final. Dr. Stewart, though receiving an extraordinary vote in his own town and neighborhood is out of it and a surprising thing is that his opponent did not hold a single meeting, though we have heard that he had a corps of about two dozen workers of the home to house order. The defeat of Dr. Stewart was a surprise and one cannot help reflecting on what may have been one cause.

The temperance forces of the riding, fresh from rolling up a big majority at the referendum decided to take a hand in, not by bringing out a candidate, but by presenting to each of the candidates a pledge, which if accepted by both, was to leave temperance workers free to follow their political leanings, but if only one took it then they were to rally to the support of that one. Dr. Stewart took the pledge. Mr. Clark demurred, and the temperance candidate has been left in the lurch by temperance voters, for certainly any approximation to the vote of the referendum would have elected Dr. Stewart. This confirms the charge often made that political affiliations are stronger than temperance sentiment.

The government has still a majority of 7, counting Mr. Gamey. Should N. Renfrew return a Liberal as before, they will have 8. Should Mr. Gamey go against them, and Renfrew return a Conservative, they will still have 5, with the speaker off, 4, and this is the worst that can be. This will take close watching by the Liberal Whips and will be an incentive to regular attendance.

### A WONDERFUL OLD MAN.

Pope Leo XIII, to-day March 3, celebrates his silver jubilee, the 25th anniversary of his coronation as Pope. This year also he celebrates his golden jubilee as Cardinal, having received the "hat" from Pius IX in 1858. Also this year he will celebrate his diamond jubilee in the episcopacy for he was ordained archbishop by Gregory XVIII in 1843. His whole life has been an exemplification of the truth, that "the race is not to the swift nor the battle to the strong." He was often delicate, life deprived of, and more than once rivals for high positions pressed their claims loudly, thinking he would soon be gone. He has outlived them all, is now over 90, and only recently physicians expressed the opinion that he might live to be 100. Apart from his power and influence in his own church, he has ever been admired for his broad and kindly spirit, and his occupancy of the papal chair has done not a little to add to the strength of the great church of which he is the head.
