Artemesia Council.

The Municipal Council of the township of Artemesia is at the town hall, Fleisherton, on Monday, the second day of March, A. D. 1903. The members were all present, the record in the Chair. Minutes of session of Feb 2, 1903, were read and confirmed. The following communications were presented and read, viz.: The Farmer's Association asking Council to pass a resolution regarding equal assessment on railways and corporations; A. McK Cameron, regarding renewal of charter of the Huron and Ontario railway Co.; Dr. Bryce, certificate of registration of births, marriages and deaths, 1902; Hart & Co., account \$3 for register, B. M. and D. Wm. Davis, account for wood or coal \$19.50.

By-law No 624, to appoint municipal officers, and 625, to appoint road commissioners, were introduced and read a first and second time. By-law 625 was read a third time, and 624 was held for completion until next meeting of council.

Gibson-Muir-That the clerk be paid \$29.84, being registrar's fees for 1902, as certified to by Dr. Bryce. Carried.

McKenzie-Best-That the money be reimbursed \$2.65, being amount advanced by him to Mrs. Allan for railway fare.

Gibson-Muir-That owing to the total disability of Fred Geo. he be allowed ten dollars per month instead of six as at present. Carried.

Gibson-Muir-That the account of John C. Wright, \$2, for title be paid. Carried.

Gibson-Muir-That the account of Wm. Davis, wood for township hall, \$19.50 be paid. Carried.

Muir-McKenzie-That \$150 be appropriated for putting crushed stone on road leading to Fleisherton station west of the limit of Fleisherton, the police trustees of Fleisherton having appropriated \$400 within their limits, and the commissioner of Div 3 having agreed to expend \$150 out of his appropriation on the same road, this special grant and commission to be applied outside the village limits. Carried.

McKenzie-Best-That Mr. M. K. Richardson, the representative of the South Riding of Grey in the Dominion House, be and is hereby requested to assist the directors of the Huron and Ontario electric railway company in obtaining an extension of their charter so that they are applying at the approaching session of Parliament. Carried.

McKenzie-Gibson-That owing to the present condition of our assessment laws agriculture has been made to bear an unequal burden of taxation, we therefore urge that our representatives in parliament have the laws so amended that the property of railroads and other public service corporations should be assessed for the same proportion of value as the property of private individuals and taxation placed upon a more equal basis and that a copy of this resolution be sent to I. B. Lucas, Esq., M. P. P. Carried.

Live Stock Markets
Toronto.

Trade at the Toronto Cattle Market today was slow and dull. The run is lower grade cattle was heavier, with the demand showing no improvement, and in these cases prices declined somewhat. The total run of offerings was 58 carloads, including 929 cattle, 455 sheep and lambs, 755 hogs, and 82 calves.
Export Cattle-Shipping cattle is very scarce, and buyers have to hold what stock they have consequently the demand for export cattle is very tight. About \$4.10 to \$4.40 was paid for good cattle today, and in one case \$4.60 was paid for a few extra fine animals.
Butchers' Cattle-Trade was slow and drab, especially in medium to common grades. Quotations for the best grades are about steady. Good to choice stock sold at about \$3.70 to \$4 per cwt. Pickled stock sold at about \$4.10 to \$4.25, and one extra lot brought \$4.40.
Stocks and Feeders-There is very little demand for these cattle, and practically none are coming forward. A small lot sold today at \$3.75 to \$3.80.
Milk Cows-Trade is quiet. There are not many cows offering, and prices are steady at \$35 to \$60 each. Good stock continues in fair demand.
Calves-The market is steady, and prices are unchanged at \$2 to \$10 each, and \$4 to \$6 per pound. There was a fair run this morning and everything was sold.
Sheep and Lambs-There was a fair run and trade was brisk enough to clear the market early in the day. Export ewes at \$3.75 to \$4.25 and ewes at \$3 to \$3.50 per cwt are steady, with the lamb trade slightly dull. Quotations are unchanged.
Hogs-The market is steady and unchanged at \$6.10 for select and \$5.95 for lights and fats. The run was fair and trade was active.
