

## WOMAN AND HER TWO FACES.

It is a physiological fact that the two sides of a woman's face are seldom in agreement. It would be, perhaps, uncharitable to call the sex Janus-faced, but notwithstanding the fact remains that a person viewing but one side of a fair one's face has no conception of what the other side looks like. One side shows certain characteristics which the other does not, and each contradicts the other.

The left side is nearly always the prettier, although it would take a very keen eye to detect any difference, but it is worth while to remember this when posing for one's photograph.

The cause of this difference in the two sides of the face is explained by scientists, who tell us—we all read know—that the brain is made up in two sections, or hemispheres, as they are called. These sections operate quite differently because of the varied functions they perform. The hemisphere on the right has to do with the physical life; that on the left is concerned with the mental qualities. As the brain is in close communication with all parts of the body, it is natural to understand that its workings can be easily read once its effect on any given muscle is understood.

The physiologists have learned to read these muscles. Ordinary folk cannot go so deeply into the subject; they simply look to find the result of muscular development in the face. Through the varied and different workings of the two brain sections the facial muscles are developed or retarded in growth.

For example, the physical characteristics of the right hemisphere of the brain produce an effect on the right side of the face much more quickly than the workings of the left hemisphere. This effect on the right side tends to set and harden the muscles on that side and to harden the features. To the experienced eye the very complexion of the right side of the face differs from the left, the bone framework of the muscles coming nearer the surface, to show their substance, in a measure, through the skin, so changing in appearance the outer color of the face.

**Christopher Columbus' Last Funeral.**  
Christopher Columbus has just been buried again, and probably for the last time. The event took place a few weeks ago in the famous and beautiful cathedral of Seville, Spain, wherein a special mausoleum had been constructed to hold the ashes of the once despised but now glorified navigator. The coffin was borne by members of the navy and was followed by a cortege headed by the Archbishop of Seville, the Minister of Marine, the Captain-General of Cadix, and other dignitaries. 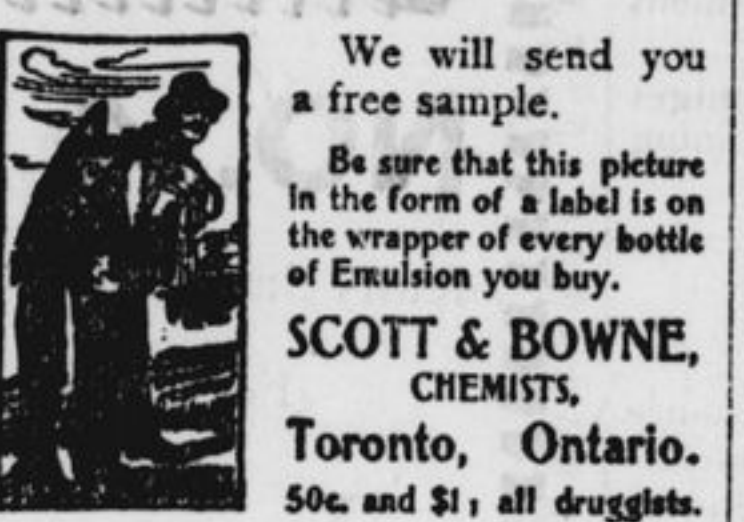
