## GALLANT HECTOR McDONALD.

Very, very sad was the news last week that Gen. Hector MacDonald had committed suicide in Paris. He was returning to Ceylon to answer to charges of immorality, which for some time have been hanging over him. Orders went out that he was to be buried in Paris, but an outburst of feeling from Scotland had the effect of bringing his body to his native land. He was buried in Edinburgh, without any military honor, but with heartfelt grief in many a heart. There are not wanting stories that the "only General Britain has that rose from the ranks" had been a victim to snobbery in certain quarters, and the fact that he denied the imputations on his character will forever make his countrymen overlook the charge and honor the services of one of her boldest and bravest sons.

## TOPICS OF THE WEEK

A record has been made in Antarctic discovery, a returned exploring party having reached 82 deg. 17 min.

The redistribution bill to be brought out this week cuts Ontario out of six members owing to the unequal relative growth of this province with Quebec. The principle of county boundaries is being rigidly adhered to.

The first bill passed at Ottawa this session is one prohibiting obscene plays.

A grant of \$50,000 has been made to the Toronto Industrial Fair by the Ottawa Government.

Shiploads of British immigrants are arriving in Canada and thousands, tens of thousands will be added to our population this year.

A great bid for peace and harmony in Ireland is being made by the Land Bill of the British Parliament, whereby gifts and loans of money are furnished to tenants to enable them to purchase their holdings. If centuries of wrong can be stoned in this way it will be chiefly done.

An active anti-cigarette campaign is being conducted by several agencies having the good of the community at heart, and pressure is being brought to bear on parliament to grant legislation to eradicate the curse of "the paper pipe." We cannot but wish a God-speed to all such efforts for the suppression of a body-destroying vice, to say nothing of its baneful effects on morals.

## LIVE STOCK MARKETS

To-day's trade conditions at the Toronto Cattle Market were similar to those of the last market day. Export cattle sold slow and easy, and butcher's were fairly active. Other live stock are about steady.

To-day's run of offerings was 54 cars, 712 cattle, 238 sheep, 978 hogs and 84 calves.

**Export Cattle**—Trade continued dull, with very few cattle wanted and few on the market. There is no space offing. Quotations continue unchanged. About \$4.30 to \$5.50 was paid for good stock, and extra picked lots sold as high as \$5.60 to \$6 per cwt.

**Butcher Cattle**—There was a fair run of stock offered, and the demand continued good, and prices were well maintained. Quotations all round are steady. The best stock on the markets sold at about \$4.50 per cwt., and the general run of stuff brought about \$4.10 to \$4.40.

**Stocker Cattle**—There was no great demand. Quotations are about steady.

**Calves**—Trade was somewhat dull, although everything was sold before the close of the market. Prices were fair or easier. Quotations are \$2 to \$10 each, and 4½¢ to 5¢ per lb.

**Lamb and Lambs**—The markets are about steady. Trade in lambs was a little dull, and sheep were fairly active. Prospects are steady.

**Hogs**—There was a good run of hogs, and prices had an easier feeling. Quotations are unchanged at \$6.62 for selects and \$6.37 for lighter and fats. Prospects are lower.
