THE GAMEY TRIAL.

The last of the witnesses for the prosecution was called on Monday, and the defence have now the floor.

The sensational flight of Mr Gamey to Buffalo we mentioned in our last issue. He came back all right, though it seemed as if for a day a gathering of the notables was taking place there.

It is certain his peculiar actions, without consulting his counsel, has brought distrust of the man and his story into all minds, and the Toronto World scored him heavily.

The prosecution called Frank Sullivan, who admits dealings with Gamey, but all in a business way, wrote many letters to him which were never produced, and denies entirely ever having received money from Stratton.

Another sensation was sprung Saturday by the story of the Mail and the World of evidence having been found in the bank books of \$3000 having been paid out to a company which Stratton was president a few days before the date of the alleged bribing.

The evidence of the Wilson's, and their daughter Mrs Sullivan, was sought by the prosecution to prove that they had been paid by the defence to get out of the way to Buffalo and Rochester.

Another sensation was caused by the publication in the Telegram of an alleged interview by one of its reporters with Frank Sullivan on one of the days of Gamey's mysterious absence.

A LETTER FROM THE WEST.

[Note by Ed.—In response to a request made by us in some previous correspondence, Miss E. Booth, so well and favorably known at Boothville, Holstein, &c., sends the following interesting letter:]

Minnedosa April 18, 1903 Dear Sir, I shall endeavor to give you some of my impressions of the now famous west hoping you will overlook grammatical errors, as this is something new for me.

I landed in Carman on Sept 4th, not in time to see much standing grain as most of it was harvested and threshing had already commenced. Threshing in Manitoba means to the housekeeper as well as to the farmer himself, no small amount of work as the enormously rapid of the Dankhobor keeps the water busy with fresh supplies of potatoes and butter.

After being in this vicinity for five months I went up as far as Moosomin and thoroughly enjoyed the pure air and generous hospitality in my three weeks' visit. The surrounding country is an open prairie and sparsely settled most of the land being bought up by American speculators who are holding it until prices advance.

After spending a couple of weeks with my friend, she and I went to Birtle, a town sixty miles west of here, and some other places in the vicinity of Minnedosa only much smaller. The place of most interest that I visited while there was the Indian School. This institution has existed for some eighteen or nineteen years in which time wonderful progress has been made in educating and Christianizing the Indian children.
