THE LATE MRS. ARCH. MCGILLIVRAY.

A friend sends us the following account of the sudden death of the above lady, whose husband is well known round the Rocky.

"It was with genuine sorrow that the friends of Mr. A. McGillivray heard of the death of his young wife, which took place at Beautiful Landing on the 21st of March. Mrs. McGillivray had not been in the best of health for some time, but until her return from a visit to her mother, Mrs. Ryan, at Moose Lodge, three days before her death, there was apparently nothing to excite alarm. Her condition then grew so serious that medical advice was summoned, but despite the doctor's skill, blood poisoning set in, and she expired in twenty-two hours.

Mrs. McGillivray was the second daughter of Mrs. Ryan, of Wabigoon, and was just 20 years of age six months old at the time of her death. She had only been married a little over a year.

The remains were brought to Wabigoon on Sunday afternoon and conveyed to Rat Portage on Tuesday morning where they were interred in Rat Portage cemetery. Archie McGillivray, Mrs. Ryan and Mrs. T. McKenzie, sister of the deceased, accompanied the remains to their last resting place.

Archie was one of the Rocky Saugen boys where he was well and favorably known and was a favorite with his companions who will be sorry to hear of his sore bereavement."
