EXTRA TRAIN ACCOMMODATION.

As soon as the cement works commenced to run at full capacity and ship their manufactured product to all parts of the Dominion, it then became apparent to the people of this town that on account of the excessive amount of freight offering there would be some difficulty experienced in handling the output without a further increase of rolling stock. Later on those anticipations became realized, passengers coming in to town by rail became annoyed at their detention at the junction of the cement switch and the trunk line. This was rather disagreeable to the travelling public but under existing circumstances could not be avoided. However the G. T. K. Co., has now a general knowledge of the extra freight they are now handling and will require to handle in future, so that they can now apply the much desired remedy in order that this congestion may be removed. The scheduled time of the present service is quite satisfactory and if the G. T. K. Co., could see it in their interest to place an additional daily freight train on the branch, this we think would be all that would be required as the passenger service would then be relieved from the extra strain now placed upon it.

On the Warton branch there is a freight train despatched from Palmerston at 6 a. m., going north, by the aid of which freight is delivered at the way stations early in the day. Whereas freight is now delivered in Durham very late in the afternoon, we would suggest that if a change is made by an additional freight train being placed on this branch that it also should leave Palmerston at 6 a. m., thereby making it more convenient all round for all concerned.

At 10 a. m. on Thursday of last week, Mr. McGuigan and Mr. Jones and one of the Directors of the G. T. R. from England arrived in the yard of the N. P. C. Co., by special train to have a look through the company's gigantic works. A deputation consisting of the mayor and members of the town council, Chas. McKinnon, County commissioner and ex-Warden, W. S. Davidson, Secy. of the Durham Gas and Oil Co.; G. Lefroy McCaul, Solicitor for the Durham Furniture Co.; John Livingston, Local Manager of the Durham Manufacturing Co., and Gilbert McKechnie, Treasurer of the N. P. C. Co., and the first President of our local railway when known as the "Georgian Bay and Wellington", availed themselves of the opportunity of presenting a petition, unanimously signed by the business portion of the community asking for further increased railway accommodation. The deputation met Mr. McGuigan in his private car and was introduced by the mayor, after which he presented the petition and introduced the matter contained therein, which was discussed in a free and easy manner. Mr. McGuigan stated that in a matter of this kind there were two distinct parties to take into consideration on the one hand there were the parties looking for returns from their investment in the Grand Trunk Railway and on the other the parties desiring to be accommodated in their traffic arrangements, both of which had to be taken into consideration and concluded by assuring them that their representations would receive fair consideration. The deputation then withdrew extra well pleased with the cordial manner in which they had been received.—Com.

NICE PREMISES.—The following good advice, given by a contemporary, fits Durham so well that we reproduce it here. All know how much "nice premises" add to the attractiveness of a town. Strangers who visit a place are favorably or unfavorably impressed by the general appearance of streets, residences and grounds. When things are bright, tidy and neat, residents themselves enjoy life much better and take a pardonable pride in the home town. Last year considerable improvement was made in our midst. New sidewalks were laid; the council saw to it that thistles and other weeds were not allowed to thrive on the streets, and citizens showed a commendable spirit in beautifying their residences and grounds. The good work should continue this season. Don't be afraid of the paint brush, the rake, the hammer and the saw.

The principal of Walkerton public school addressed a public letter to the parents of younger children, in which he says: "It is the almost unanimous opinion of teachers that no child should attend school until at least six years of age, and many not till seven. While teaching an ungraded school I noted that at which every pupil started to school, and in every instance those who started at seven or eight years passed those who had started at five, in two years or less, with no apparent fatigue or injury, while many of those who started at five were permanently injured in bodily and mental powers. At five years of age children have not the ideas or command of language to profit by formal teaching, and their brains are not strong enough to study for several hours a day, any more than their little bodies are strong enough to endure regular body work for the same time.
