Ontario thus loses 6 members as a whole, but as 3 new members are to be given to the fast developing New Ontario, Old Ontario will really lose 9.

Toronto has 5 members. Middlesex, (including London) 4. Wentworth, (including Hamilton,) Carleton (including Ottawa,) Grey, Simcoe, York, Algoma, Huron, Leeds and Grenville, Durham and Northumberland 3 each.

Essex, Kent, Elgin, Lambton, Bruce, Wellington, Perth, Lanark, Renfrew, Frontenac (including Kingston), Hastings, Peterboro, Waterloo, Oxford, Ontario, Brant, 2 each

Norfolk, Haldimand, Welland, Lincoln, Muskoka, Parry Sound, Peel, Dufferin, Halton Nipissing, Prescott, Gengarry, Stormont, Russell, Dundas, Lennox and Addington, Prince Edward, Victoria, one each.

The ridings of Bothwell, Brockville, Cardwell and West Ontario disappear. Dufferin takes the place of Cardwell, and Lennox and Addington are united.

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On the other hand, the ridings of Norfolk, Middlesex, Bruce, Wellington, Hastings, Durham (with Northumberland), lose one each.

THE GAMEY-STRAITON AFFAIR. This contest - some will have it a lying contest - who is the best liar - still drags on, and among the late moves a lady is to be dragged from Winnipeg to swear she rode in a carriage with Mrs. Stratton on one of the famous September days.

Mr Gamey found it necessary to explain where he got the \$900 to deposit to Crossin's credit, and in Buffalo, so four reporters testify, said he had gathered it during the summer. Before the commission he swears it was part of \$1200 he borrowed from Frank Sullivan from his (Sullivan's) share of the bribe money and for which he gave him an I. O. U. A startling sequel to this came on Saturday when the two judges ordered Gamey to pay this \$1200 also into court, seeing Sullivan declared he never gave Gamey money, yet Gamey declares it was bribe money and therefore not his. Mr Gamey and his counsel kept a discreet silence when the order was given.

But Mr Stratton has also got a damaging blow, which he has not yet denied or explained. Hammond the Globe reporter, swears that Stratton since the charges were made asked him to forget some of the interview. Mr Hammond didn't forget the interview however, nor did he forget to tell of the apparently incriminating request of the minister. Nothing the reporter has told is so damaging as the insinuation that the minister had something to hide, and it is incumbent on Mr Stratton to explain.

It is gratifying to find the judges determined to get to the bottom of the affair, and every lover of old-fashioned truth will hope they will succeed, whoever suffers.

TOPICS OF THE WEEK - Great dissatisfaction exists among temperance leaders on learning that government does not intend to introduce restrictive legislation at this session. If it be true, as alleged, that this was ready, and only delayed by the Gamey fizzle, we think the dissatisfaction is justified, but otherwise it would be unwise and impracticable to begin to lay the foundations of new restrictions amid the dazzling poetry and excellent witnessed in the Gamey-Stratton case.

Liquor is bad but lying is worse, and the energies of both parties should be spent in clearing up the muddle to the satisfaction of the public, before other far-reaching measures are entered upon.

Circuses and Menageries running more than 20 cars, will by a proposed Act of the Legislature have to pay in advance a License fee of \$100 a day and \$15 and \$10 for side shows, for every day they propose exhibiting in the province.

Vaccination or inoculation for Small-pox has of recent years been rousing much opposition and an act has been introduced into the Legislature by Mr. Kribs removing every compulsory feature. This may carry but there will be many who look upon the practice as a well proved safeguard, to predict that the voluntary system will bring about results that may cause the pendulum to swing the other way.

THE REDISTRIBUTION. By the new Redistribution bill, which the government is in duty bound to introduce after each new census some interesting changes take place in the representation. Quebec is the standard to fix representation, always having 65 members, so that if that province increases in a faster ratio than the others, the others will lose members, if in a slower ratio the others will gain members.

The Territories and Manitoba are in the latter position, and will gain, Ontario and the maritime provinces, lose.

Dividing Quebec's population by 65 gives approximately 25000 as the unit. Dividing Ontario's population by this unit gives her 86 members, where before she had 92.

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Live Stock Markets Toronto.

All lines of cattle showed considerable activity at the Toronto Cattle Market this morning. The feature of the day's trade was the still firmer feeling in butchers' cattle which was the direct result of an increased demand.

Hog prices are unchanged, but the market feeling is decidedly easier.

Export Cattle - There was a fairly large run of cattle offering, but the demand was not so brisk as it had been on the previous day, and prices had an easier tone. Quotations, however, continued unchanged, with about \$4.85 to \$5.15 paid for the best, and \$4.40 to \$4.75 for medium grade.

Butcher Cattle - There was a good demand for butcher cattle both from the local trade and from outside points.

To-day small picked lots of good cattle sold as high as \$5 per cwt. and for the best cattle ranged from that figure down to \$4.50. Fair to good sold at about \$4.20 to \$4.50, and inferior sold at about \$3 to \$3.50.

Milk Cows - There was a fair run of about 20 cows. The demand was good and all were sold. Prices are a little firmer at \$35 to \$60 each.

Calves - Prices are quoted unchanged and prospects are steady.

Sheep and Lambs - Trade was fairly good, and everything was sold. Heavy sheep were dull, and light were about steady. The market for spring lambs was also firm.

Hogs - The run was not very heavy, but the market was dull and prices had an easier feeling. Quotations are at present unchanged, and prospects are lower.
