

# TURKISH TROOPS DESTROY A SUSPECTED VILLAGE.

## Police Capture Quantities of Explosives Hid at Salonica.

**Tekub, European Turkey, May 18.**—Turkish troops have destroyed the village of Warkow, near Schelipje, where they suspected bombs were concealed.

**An Important Capture.**  
Salonica, May 18.—The police have unearthed 700 pounds of dynamite and quantities of gunpowder.

**Troubles in Croatia.**  
Buda Pest, May 18.—There was recently a serious peasant demonstration in Croatia, especially in the Kreuz district where the castles and houses of Hungarian landowners were attacked and pillaged. Martial law was declared. Similar disorders have occurred at Brod, Siseck and other places.

Premier de Szell has had an audience of Emperor Francis Joseph, who arrived here to-day. After this interview the Premier announced in the Lower House that troops would be sent to every place where a breach of the peace was threatened. A special army corps has been placed at the disposal of the Ban of Croatia for that purpose, in addition to the ordinary garrisons. The peasants are accused by absurd rumors to the effect that the late Crown Prince Rudolph is alive, that he is coming to help the peasant get his own, and that the Emperor has forbidden his soldiers to shoot at them.

**Massacre Story Denied.**  
St. Petersburg, May 18.—The report published in the United States that a massacre of Jews, similar to the one which took place recently at Kishineff, capital of Bessarabia, had occurred at Tirsoopol, seven miles from Kishineff, is officially denied and is universally discredited.

**The Story Reiterated.**  
St. Petersburg, May 18.—Additional details of the Kishineff massacre of Jews are printed here daily. The correspondents give the number of victims thus far buried in the Jewish cemetery as 44, and say that 34 persons seriously wounded are still in the Jewish hospital. The horrors reported scarcely bear repetition. In one instance spikes were driven through a woman's head into the floor, and cases of boy mutilation have been authenticated. About 800 to 1,000 persons were arrested, an official having been sent from Odessa to deal with the situation. The assembly of the local authorities during two days of rapine and murder has been fully established.

**Trouble Feared To-morrow.**  
Rostoff-in-the-Don, Russia, May 18.—The Social Democrats are doing their utmost to induce the public to co-operate in starting disturbances on labor day, to-morrow. The agitators are alleged to possess arms and boxes of dynamite. The authorities have posted placards announcing that stringent measures will be adopted for the preservation of order.

**Constantinople, May 12.**—The Sultan has warned the Governors of

**BRITISH AND FOREIGN.**

All the railroads in Florida are incapacitated on account of the floods. It is reported that the Bagdad Railway project is to be revived in the form of a new international route to India.

**ARTHUR PIERS, MANAGER.**

Will Control the Pacific and Atlantic C. P. R. Fleets.

Montreal, May 18.—The official announcement of the appointment of Arthur Piers, of the C. P. R., to the position of manager of the steamship line was only issued this morning. Mr. Piers will have both the Atlantic and Pacific fleets of the company under his control. His office, as heretofore, will be in Montreal. Mr. Piers said this morning that all the C. P. R. vessels plying in Atlantic waters would now come to Montreal, and that four of them, the Montrose, the Lake Erie, the Mount Royal and the Monterey, were now in port.

**TO HONOR MACDONALD.**

Ottawa Scots Would Have a Canadian Memorial.

Ottawa, May 18.—At a joint meeting of St. Andrew's Society and the Sons of Scotland last night a committee introduced a resolution embodying a panegyric on the late Gen. Hector Macdonald and recommending that a committee be appointed to secure expressions of opinion from representative Scottish bodies throughout Canada as to the advisability of erecting a monument in the capital of the Dominion in commemoration of the achievement of this lamented Scottish hero. The idea of erecting a distinct Canadian memorial seemed to prevail, and eloquent speeches were made in support of it by Rev. Mr. McIntosh, Rev. Norman McLeod, Lt.-Col. McMillan and others. The committee which drew up the resolution was again appointed to carry on the work.

**MADMAN IN VESSEL'S HOLD**

Has Been There Nineteen Days and Scares the Crew.

MAY BE DEAD OR ALIVE NOW

Halifax, N. S., May 18.—The Norwegian barque Emigrant, Capt. T. Erolsen, arrived to-night from Bermuda with a madman in her hold, who has been there for the past 19 days. The Emigrant left Bermuda for Halifax on the 16th of April, and has therefore been 26 days on the passage. A few days out one of the crew, the carpenter, who had been shipped at Bermuda, showed signs of insanity, and got into the hold, where he said he would stay. He kept his word for three days, food being sent down to him at the end of that time he returned to the deck, but crazy as ever. He so annoyed and alarmed the crew, that they overpowered him, put him in irons, and locked him in the fore-castle. He afterwards, with superhuman strength, he broke his fetters, dashed down the door, and again rushed into the hold. This was 19 days ago. Every effort was made to capture him, but none of these were successful. At last attempt, the mate and one of the crew went down to see what they could do. They beat a retreat and turned when fired upon by the madman, who had, no one knew how, procured a revolver. The crew were panic-stricken, and he was allowed to remain. This time everybody on board was thoroughly afraid, so they fastened down the hatches to prevent his coming up and perhaps committing murder. Food was lowered to him by a bucket, and for the first five days the madman helped himself to it. Since then, however, the food has remained untouched, and no sign seen or heard of the frenzied man. It is possible that he has crawled into some corner and died, or he may have shot himself. The crew to-night are still afraid to go into the hold, fearing that the man is

yet alive, and may use as a protection the empty casks with which the barque is loaded. With a pistol in his hands he might be able to do considerable damage before being captured.

**A MACEDONIAN LEADER**

To Marry Miss Calhoun, a Well-known English Actress.

London, May 18.—Miss Eleanor Calhoun is receiving congratulations upon her engagement and approaching marriage. Her stage career, which has been an honorable and brilliant one, both in London and Paris, is closed by an Oriental romance. She will soon be married to one of the founders and leaders of the Macedonian movement. He is Eugene Lazar Lazarevitch. From his countrymen living in London it is learned that he is the present head of an old dynasty ruling for 700 years in the Balkans, of which ancient kingdom and Empire Macedonia was a province. For this reason he cannot enter Serbia, as the Government there considers him to be a possible pretender to the Crown. He has taken an active part in the Macedonian movement for twenty-five years, and has expended a large fortune in promoting the cause of the liberation of the Balkan population. He has been in England during the last year, and has been laboring ardently for the Macedonian cause, holding conferences with Sarafoff and other leaders, helping to raise money for the movement, and to arouse sympathy for it among the western nations. Miss Calhoun is the daughter of Judge Calhoun, of California.

**SPIRITS MADE HIM SIGN.**

Explorer Cavendish Deeded Away Property at Request of Ghosts.

London, May 18.—The Chancery Court to-day ordered the cancellation of the deed by which H. S. Cavendish, the explorer, provided that his property should go to Mrs. Cavendish, wife of Major C. H. Strutt, and her children, to the exclusion of the plaintiff's own wife, who was Isabel Jay, formerly leading lady of the Savoy Theatre. Mr. Cavendish, in his appeal to the Chancery Court, charged Major Strutt and Mrs. Strutt with influencing him through table-turning, and claimed that Mrs. Strutt obtained the deed by pretending to be the ghost of his (the plaintiff's) mother, and by representing that she was speaking from Heaven, and advising him to dispose of his property.

# NIAGARA FALLS TO BOOM; GREAT SCHEMES PROJECTED.

## Capitalists With \$10,000,000 Going Into Vast Projects.

Niagara Falls despatch: A. J. Wright, of Buffalo, has purchased between 2,000 and 3,000 acres of land on the Canadian side of the Niagara River, between Slater's Point and Drummondville. Mr. Wright is presumed to represent a syndicate which desires to control all the big generator plants now being proposed or being constructed on the Canadian side.

The new syndicate, it is said, will construct a large number of manufacturing plants to take part of the electrical energy generated there. The first of these is to be a mammoth steel converting plant, and another steel converting plant, and a roller mill. Ore will be brought down from the upper lakes to a point near Chippewa. The Hennepin Securities Company, recently incorporated at Albany, is slated to take charge of the manufacturing developments.

The reason that the Canadian side of the river has been chosen lies, it is claimed, in the difference in land values. With precisely similar opportunities for advancement, land on the American side is worth \$6,000 an acre and on the Canadian side but \$100 to \$200 an acre.

These capitalists have \$10,000,000 to spend in obtaining and developing the immense area of factory sites which has been secured. Already several big plants are practically arranged for, the biggest being a steel converter plant.

The plan involves the building of big docks along the Canadian side of the river, the channel on the Canadian side being superior to that on the United States side. The organization of the Hennepin Securities Company recently is said to be a part of the scheme. J. F. MacDonald, the local agent of A. J. Wright, would not talk for publication, but admitted that Mr. Wright was behind the big land deals which have excited interest in Canada for the last six months.

Taken in connection with the 350 acre shipbuilding plant to be built by the Toronto & Niagara Power Company at Bridgeburg, it is evident that the Canadian side of the river, which has been dormant since 1812, is to have a general development under the impetus of electric power similar to that on the American side.

Another plan which is spoken of is the possibility of deepening the Chippewa River channel to the Welland Canal, which will admit big lake vessels to reach industries using Niagara power on the Canadian side at little expense.

Later—Mr. Wright says the land bought is near Hamilton.

**CHEATED THE GALLOW.**

Wife-Murderer Poisons Himself With Morphine

Lexington, Ky., May 18.—William McCarty, wife murderer, who was to have been hanged at 8 o'clock this morning, took morphine some time during the night, and died this morning.

The death watch, Alexander McKeever, sat within three feet of McCarty all night, but says he is absolutely at a loss to know how or when McCarty took the drug. At 10 o'clock McCarty became restless. Jailor Robert Wallace was in the cell at the time. McCarty called for whiskey, but Wallace brought him coffee instead. He drank the coffee and went into violent convulsions.

**SENTENCED TO DEATH.**

The Veronica Mutineers Found Guilty.

St. John, May 18.—A cable to William Thomson & Co. this evening brings word from Liverpool that the Veronica mutineers were convicted of murder to-day in the Liverpool court, and were sentenced to death. The prisoners numbered four. The Veronica was a barque, owned by William Thomson & Co. On the high seas last December some of her crew mutinied, and then ensued one of the most atrocious series of murders which have been chronicled in the annals of the modern merchant navy. Captain Shaw, who was a Prince Edward Islander, his mate and five of his crew were shot or driven overboard. Then the mutineers provisioned a boat, fired the barque and left. They were picked up and taken to Liverpool, but the story of their awful crime was given out by one of the number, and the trial of four of the men followed.

**SUNK BY DYNAMITERS.**

A STARTLING MEMORANDUM

New York, May 18.—Among the effects of the men who sent the infernal machine to the Cunard Line dock last week was a piece of paper on which was written in French: "The destruction of the Naronic was complete. Mr. Le Brun, who made the box, has this moment gone to Chicago."

The Naronic left Liverpool, February 11th, 1893, with 4,000 tons of freight, a crew of 55 men, and fifteen passengers, who had gone to England on the previous trip in charge of a cargo of cattle. She was never seen after she left the Mersey.

**Machine Made in Chicago.**

Chicago, May 18.—The Chicago police this afternoon discovered three men, who, it is believed, unsuspectingly assisted the mysterious "G. Russell" in manufacturing his deadly device. They are J. W. Seymour, carpenter; J. W. Eisenberg, blacksmith, and John Clarke, machinist, whose shops are in the vicinity of the apartment occupied by Russell.

**MESSAGE RESTORES LIFE.**

New York Doctor Announces Startling Discovery to Profession.

New York, May 18.—Dr. Robert Coleman Kemp, of No. 107 East 57th street, has proved that scientific massage can restore a patient, apparently dead, to life. This was his startling announcement to the New York Academy of Medicine at its meeting last night. Dr. Kemp's method is to cut a small incision between the ribs, insert the finger behind the heart, and with a few gentle, rhythmic pressures, revive the circulation. In conjunction with this process is an artificial respiration produced with a pump. Experiments made on dogs have proved successful.

**A TERRIBLE STORY.**

Woman Terribly Tortured and Child-Killed.

New York, May 18.—The American, which has seen Michael Davitt to Kishineff to report upon the recent anti-Semitic outbreak there, publishes the following special from St. Petersburg: The papers here at last publish the horrible details of the Jewish massacres at Kishineff. It is admitted that a carpenter had both hands sawn off, that women had their eyes gouged out, that some victims had their arms pulled from the sockets, and that scores of children were thrown out of windows and killed. The condition of those that are left is terrible, and at least four thousand families are in absolute want.

Tuxpan, Jalisco, Mexico, May 18.—There has been another eruption of Colima volcano, accompanied by deafening subterranean noises, an abundant flow of lava and the heavy rain of ashes. People on the haciendas and ranches in the neighborhood of the volcano, have abandoned their pueblos for safer places.
