CYCLONE NEAR LISTWELL.—Tuesday of last week one of the deadly funnels shaped clouds over Listwell, blowing wide and 4 miles long through the township of Mornington, wrecking completely and leveling everything in its path. No lives were lost (it was after school hours) but several severely injured. The only safety in these whirlwinds is to fly to the cellar.

CALLED A MINISTER.—The congregations of Rocky Saugreen and Dornoch met at the latter place Tuesday at 2 p. m., and happily agreed on Rev. Mr. Acheson of Seaford. He was selected on the first vote by an unmistakable majority, and as two others had received a few votes a motion to make unanimous by C. McFayden of the Rocky and Geo. Ledingham of Dornoch, was carried. Congratulations on getting settled so soon.

Normanby Council at its meeting last week appointed Mr. R. J. Fortune, clerk, to succeed Mr. Geo. Hopf. His opponent was Mr. Louis J. Roedding and the Ayton Advance thinks that a "strong and popular candidate has been thrown down by a weaker and less doing in that council. The job is now worth \$100 a year and no pickings, which will be no fortune to Mr Fortune.

Neglected Children in the Co. of Grey An interesting lecture was given Monday night in the Town Hall by the Rev. Jas. Lediard of Owen Sound, the well-known agent of the Child's Protection Society. The Rev. lecturer began by giving a very clear exposition of the Child's Protection Act and how it was being carried out by nearly 30 societies in the Province, who have rescued and placed in homes over 2000 children—most of these belong to this county. Many illustrations were given of cruelty and neglect and immoral surroundings from which these children had been taken and of the good homes and happy conditions in which they now are. The economic side of the work was also referred to, the speaker pointing out the very slight cost of placing a child in a home as over against the cost of their maintenance in an institution and he further said that the number committed to the provincial reformatories was much less since the introduction of the Children's Aid Society. The lecturer publicly acknowledged the very constant and judicious help given him at all times by constable Jas. Carson, who, he said, had been a warm friend of the Society since its beginning. A strong plea was made in closing for financial help from the town of Durham, the speaker saying that no less than 14 children had been removed from this section of the county at much labor and a good deal of cost to the Society and as yet no general appeal had ever been made for contributions. He hoped that something substantial would be done in the future.

As a result of the meeting, the following ladies were appointed a committee to solicit contributions and they will call on the citizens at an early date for this purpose: Mrs. Grant, Mrs. McArthur, Mrs. Ramage, Miss Stewart, Mrs. Wolfe. Ex-warden Binnie filled the chair and spoke approvingly of the work as did also Revd's Farquharson and Ryan.

A number of Tenders were received for sprinkling the streets, Dan Campbell being thought the most advantageous for the corporation.

Hunter—McLachlan—That Dan Campbell's tender be accepted for sprinkling the streets for the season of 1903 and the Mayor and clerk to draw out an agreement with him.

John H Brown—McLachlan—That the prayer of ratepayers asking for granolithic sidewalk on George St be granted with the exception of that portion from Garafraza St to Queen St which shall be built within one foot of outside line and that the petition of ratepayers asking for granolithic sidewalk on Bruce Street be granted in full and that action be taken at once to comply with the Statute. Carried.

J H Brown—McLachlan—That the prayer of ratepayers asking for granolithic sidewalk on Lambton St be granted and that action be taken at once to comply with the same according to Statute. Defeated.

Health Inspector Warner reports finding the town in a favorable condition with the exception of some three or four places, the parties promising to comply with the regulations at once.
