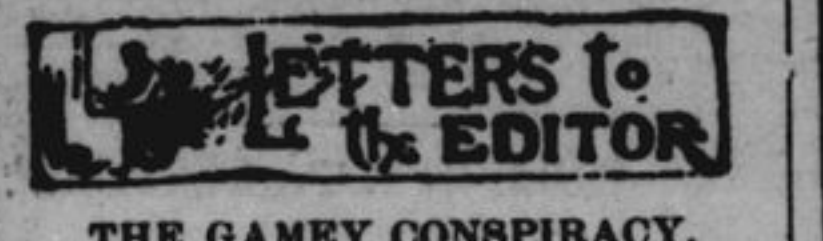

Artemesia Council.

The Municipal Council met in the town
 hall, Flesherton, on Saturday, the 30th
 day of January, A. D. 1903, after the as-
 sessment of the Court of Revision. The
 members were all present, the Reeve in
 the chair. The minutes of last session
 were read and confirmed.

McKenzie—Best—That the account of
 J. B. Doney of 65 cents for repairing
 grader, be paid; also the account of T. A.
 Gilchrist, for repairing scraper, 75 cents
 be paid.—Carried.

McKenzie—Muir—That the Sawyer,
 Massey Co. be paid \$34 for scrapers and 60
 cents for repairs for grader and freight on
 same \$1.90.—Carried.

Gibson—Muir—That the assessor be
 paid \$80, his salary, and five dollars for
 taking schol census, as per by-law.—
 Carried.

Best—McKenzie—That the Reeve and
 Mr. Gibson be paid \$2 each for committee
 work on bridges.—Carried.

McKenzie—Muir—That the Reeve be
 paid \$22 for his time and expenses going
 to Ottawa, on railway deputation.—Car-
 ried.

McKenzie—Gibson—That \$60 be grant-
 ed to be expended on 30th side road be-
 tween con. 12 & 14; this amount to be
 expended under the supervision of com-
 missioner No 4.—Carried.

Muir—Gibson—That this council hav-
 ing heard the report of the representatives
 appointed by it to go to Ottawa to inter-
 view the Minister of Railways and Canals,
 in favor of granting the usual subsidy to
 the Tilsburg, Lake Erie and Pacific
 Railway, for the extension of its line from
 Ingersoll to Collingwood, do hereby for
 the purpose of ratifying the action of its
 representative and further urging its views
 in support of granting of such subsidy
 respectfully beg leave to represent to the
 Dominion Government as follows: That
 the proposed line would supply a section
 of country which at present is in the
 need of railway facilities, such as would be
 secured by the construction of this line.
 As our railways are at present constructed,
 they all lead to Toronto and Hamilton,
 with no direct connection to south-western
 Ontario, and as a consequence the farmers'
 market is limited to the said cities. It is
 believed that by the construction of a
 cross country railway a larger market
 would be opened up and trade and com-
 merce would be materially facilitated,
 while to the travelling public it would be of
 a very great advantage in making cross
 country connections, with existing lines.
 Over a very considerable length of the
 proposed line better railway facilities are
 absolutely required in order that agricul-
 tural interests may prosper and be reliev-
 ed from the handicap which presses upon
 them so severely by a constricted market
 and inability to ship their products at the
 most opportu- moment.—Carried.
 Council adjourned.—Advance.

Court of Revision.

The members of the council of the
 township of Artemesia met on Saturday

as a Court of Revision on the assessment
 roll of 1903. The members were all pres-
 ent, the Reeve was appointed chairman.
 Each of the said members subscribed and
 made the required oath as a member of
 the court. The following appeals were
 then disposed of: No 1—Patrick Sul-
 livan, lot 8, con 6, appealed that the as-
 sessment was too high.

Muir—Gibson—That the assessment on
 lot 8, con 6, be reduced \$75.—Carried.

No. 2—T. S. Sproule appealed against
 the assessment of lot 105, 1 N E and part
 of lot 150, 2nd S W as being too high.

McKenzie—Best—That the appeal of
 T. S. Sproule against the assessment of lot
 105, 1 N E and part 150, 2 S W be not
 entertained.—Carried.

No. 3—A. O. Hoeg appealed against
 the assessment of mill reserves in the
 town plot of Eggenon, as being too high.

Gibson—Best—That the appeal of A. O.
 Hoeg against his assessment, be not en-
 tertained.—Carried.

No 4—W. S. Christie appealed against
 his assessment in the village of Flesh-
 erton.

Muir—Best—That the assessment of W.
 Christie on lot 7, Toronto street, be re-
 duced \$100 amount part 4, block A be
 reduced \$50.—Carried.

No. 5.—J. W. Frost appealed against the
 assessment of the estate of the late R. Mc-
 Lean Purdy, that certain lots were sold to
 S. W. Sloan and should be assessed to him
 and valuation on the remainder that was
 too high, etc.

Muir—Gibson—That S. W. Sloan be
 entered on roll as owner for lots 10 to 13,
 inclusive, on south side of Codrington st.,
 that W. J. 24, Simpson, south, be assessed
 to Margaret C. Purdy, and in other
 respects the assessment roll be sustained,
 regarding the appeal of J. W. Frost. Car-
 ried.

Muir—Gibson—That the assessment
 roll for the year 1903, as finally revised by
 this court, be the roll for assessment and
 other purposes for the year 1903, and that
 the Clerk certify the same.—Carried.
