GLENELG COUNCIL.
 The council met May 26, and after making necessary declarations, organized as a Court of Revision. All the members present, the Reeve was appointed as chairman. Changes were made as follows: Alex Lyous, assessed for Lot 10, Con 3, Con 2 E G R. instead of Robert McClyment; Wm H Billings assessed for the Mortimer property instead of Archie McLean; Assessment of Jas C Ross was reduced to \$1500; Lionel Robson entered as tenant for Lots 3 & 4, Con 1, N D R. Archie Little entered as tenant for Lot 13 Con 1, S D R; Thomas Jack and Joseph Young assessed for west and east half of Lot 1, Con 12 respectively; George Twambley assessed for Lot 10, Con 3, E G R; W D Davis entered for Lots 1 & 2, Con 3, N D R; Geo McKechnie entered for Lots 2 and 3, Con 2, N D R; Matthew Scott assessed for his Priceville Lots; Emma Brown's assessment reduced to \$300; Richard Banks assessed for \$4 of Lot 30, Con 3, E G R. The assessments of Thos C McGirr and Wm Ector were reduced \$50 each. The assessment of J A Carson was reduced \$40. The Court adjourned to June 13 at 1 p m.
 After adjournment of Court of Revision the Council met for general business. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. The Treasurer presented his statement of Receipts and Expenditures up-to-date. Communications read as follows: David McIntyre re Townline G & F, from Robert Legate re Railway Bonding, from Hugh McDonald and 27 others, petition re townline G & E.
 Arrowsmith—Kerney—That the ward appropriation be \$200 for each division and that no commissioner exceed that amount without the sanction of Council.—Carried.
 Kerney—Sullivan—That Thos Dunn be paid \$1.25 per week for the keep of Miss Furneaux, until further notice is given, commencing 13th of April 1903. Carried.
 Davis—Kerney—That the clerk be and is hereby instructed to advise notify the councils of Holland and Bentick to forward to the Treasurer of Glenelg their share of costs of repairs on townlines G & H and G & B and if not paid within a reasonable time that our solicitor be instructed to take legal action for the collection of the same. Carried.
 Kerney—Arrowsmith—That the Reeve and Commissioner for ward 1 be a committee to wait on the owners of lots 49, 50 and 51, con 3, E G R to arrange terms of grant in regard to opening ditch across said lots and report at next meeting of council.—Carried.
 Davis—Sullivan—That the assessor be paid \$25 being the balance of his salary as assessor for 1903. Carried.
 Kerney—Arrowsmith—That Geo Furneaux be paid the sum of \$4 being the balance due him for keep of Mrs Furneaux, and that O. Sound hospital be paid \$51 for keep of Miss Wise. Carried.
 Arrowsmith—Kerney—That A S Walker be paid the sum of \$45 for work at lot 98, townline G & A 1/2 cost, also Geo Leitch \$75 part pay on timber for bridge at lot 20, con 11. Carried.
 Davis—Sullivan—That John Staples be paid fifty cents for repairing bridge at lot 56, con 2, E G R. Also Hugh Baird \$25 for new tongue and other repairs of road scraper. Carried.
 Davis—Sullivan—That the Reeve and Wm Kerney be a committee to examine the roads at lot 6, con 9, and report at next meeting of council. Carried.
 The council adjourned to June 13th at 10 a. m. J. S. BLACK, Clerk.
