ROYALTY BUTCHERED IN SERBIA.

Last Thursday a section of the Serbian army took matters into its own hands and aided by treachery amongst the royal servants, entered the palace at dead of night, and shot and stabbed to death in wild fury the King and Queen, the queen's two brothers, several of the ministry about a dozen in all. They got through about 2 a. m., an appointee of the army issued a proclamation, urging calmness from the populace, and the populace were calm, even pleased it seems with the ghastly deed of blood.

King Alexander, never popular, made matters worse a few years ago by marrying Queen Draga, a woman of low rank and low morals, nine years his senior. Both were thoroughly hated, and having no children, a rumor that she was conniving to have her brother made heir roused the people. The plot has been hatching for some time.

It is decidedly skooking to have such a deed occur and still see the people and surrounding nations viewing the affair with apparent equanimity even complaisance, and thinking "no trouble was likely to arise since Alexander was not related to any reigning European family"! Anarchy has received a strong endorsement if this affair does not bring condign punishment on somebody, so evident is that world opinion that was so evident in the Dreyfus case? We need what Tennyson foresaw "A Parliament of Man, the Federation of the World."

OBITUARY.

In addition to our notice of the death of Mrs. Flora McKinnon last week, the following has been furnished us:

"After many weeks of suffering borne with Christian patience, Flora McKinnon, widow of the late John McKinnon, passed to her long home on Sabbath morning, June 7th, at her home near the Rocky Saugeen.

The deceased was a native of Suile, Mull, Argyleshire, Scotland. She came to this country in 1846 with her mother and brothers. The family settled about a mile north of the Rocky, in the town of Glenelg. In March 1856 she married John McKinnon, who predeceased her 25 years ago, to them were born eight sons and one daughter. Seven sons remain to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother. The sons are Chas. John and Allan, of Durham; Donald, John Jr., Toronto; Malcolm, Port Arthur and Angus on the home. All were present at the last sad rites, excepting Malcolm. She also leaves two brothers, Alexander and Archibald McKinnon, Bentinck. Deceased was of a kind and affectionate disposition, loved and respected by all who knew her. The bereaved sons will mourn her loss but not as those who mourn who have no hope of a blessed reunion. The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon to the Rocky Saugeen Cemetery and was a very large one. Rev. Mr. Farquharson conducted an impressive service at the house and grave. The six grief stricken sons of the deceased acted as pall-bearers. The handsome casket was decked with a pillow of beautiful flowers inscribed with the word "mother."

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

This body met in Vancouver last week, the first time any high court of any church has met west of the Rockies. Such a meeting cannot fail to emphasize the fact that Canada is one country, and the impressions and experience gained by the large number of educated thinkers and talkers is bound to influence for good the older districts. In 1871 there were nine Presbyterian preaching places west of Lake Superior, now 1400, comprising 18 presbyteries, forming two of the six Synods of the Canadian Church. In 1871 British Columbia was not even in Canada, now it is a link of empire ever becoming more important.

The attendance was surprisingly large considering the expense of reaching the far-away location.

Rev. D. H. Fletcher, D. D., the new moderator, was elected without opposition. He is pastor of McNab St. Church, Hamilton, where he has been continuously for 31 years. He was born in Islay, Scotland in 1833, is a scholarly man and has had a fruitful ministry.

In attendance from our district are: Rev. Mr. Matheson and Mr. Don McDonald, Priceville, and Mr. Donald Smith, of Dornoch.

The New Moderator is well-known in Egrement, where he has many relatives. He is full cousin to Mr. Chas. McInnes, and the McFadyen's, McLachlan's and others are nearly all connected. Years ago he opened Fairbairn church while visiting his uncle, Mr. McInnes' father.

—The Legislators of the Ontario house are this year to get \$1000 for their services, and it will likely stay at that.
