WELL DONE STANDARD BANK.—The Monetary Times last week has the following notice of the Bank whose branch here is so popular: "It does not need a long story to present the results of the Standard Bank's business for the year ended with May. With resources of fourteen million in round figures, that bank earned \$181,883 net. Of this \$100,000 was paid in dividend at ten per cent. \$75,000 was added to reserve fund and the balance was carried forward. This is a very satisfactory showing, and justifies the resolutions of appreciation awarded to the directors and staff by the shareholders. While the circulation of the bank remains at about the same figure as a year ago, the deposits have increased by almost a million."

HOTEL CHANGE.—Mr. Allan McDougall having received an offer several hundred dollars in advance of what he had for the Ries hotel, has sold out to Mr. V. Hahn, formerly of Middaugh House. Mr. Hahn takes possession next Wednesday. NEW BRIDGE.—At the special meeting of the Town Council Monday night, nothing special was done, the Cement bridge estimates being thought too high. The Hamilton Bridge Co. were asked to tender for an iron bridge, built on the abutments of cement, the work being done by day labor by the town. BAPTIST SUCCESS.—The adjourned Garden Party on Friday night in Mr. Garner's fine grounds proved a great success, the sum of \$85 being realized. The weather was admirable, and the grounds, illuminated as usual, was thronged with merry young people who kept the host of waiters busy. The band enlivened the evening. GRAND GARDEN PARTY.—The Ladies Aid of the Presbyterian Church intend having a grand garden party on Thursday July the 9th, on the beautiful grounds of Mrs. Gun St. Plenty of ice-cream, cake, tea and coffee, lemonade, and other refreshments will be provided. IMPROVED SURROUNDINGS.—Monday quite a number of Presbyterian workers met at the church, "bee" style, and made improvements in the line of beauty and utility. The front is much improved by the cutting of the grass on the street and the filling up of a grassy slope in front. The town would be much improved if the grass and weeds all along were cut and cleared away. CO. ASSESSMENT.—At the meeting of the County Council last week some adjustments were made, a few of which affect this district. Notably has been increased by \$100,000 and Egremont is increased by that amount. Glenagh has had \$80,000 more placed on it, Durham \$25,000, and Hanover \$25,000. The result is the increase of the Co. Assessment by about \$20,000. TO DESCEND ON TORONTO.—Many cities in the United States and in the outlying provinces of Canada have formed Old Boys' Associations and Societies for the purpose of making organized descent upon Toronto from July 1 to 4, the days of the great Home Corners Festival, promoted by the Board of Trade of that city, and liberal endorsed and aided by the corporation and the citizens at large, who have subscribed some \$25,000 to be expended on fetes, fireworks, on spectacular illumination of the Bay, the Harbor and the Island, and in prizes at an open air horse show and parade, at rowing and canoeing regattas and so on. In addition to these fetes there are to be garden parties, concerts and entertainments on an extensive scale, a huge banquet, a military review and an Old Boys' parade, at which Detroit, Buffalo, Cleveland, Rochester and other places propose to be represented by matching clubs hundreds of strong, with banners, badges and bands. Reduced rates on all lines of travel have been secured.

OWEN SOUND DEFEATED. Durham wins first league Lacrosse Match in District No. 3. Score, 9 to 2. Tuesday last, the Owen Sound Lacrosse team met their Waterloo at the hands of the Durham boys before one of the largest crowds seen at a lacrosse match here. It was practically the same team that Durham defeated here last year, as 8 or 9 of the O. S. players were seniors. It was a fairly clean game, only two or three players being hurt, little Jimmy Lavelle's cut on the head being the most serious, which, however, did not affect his playing. The Durham boys easily played the best game though the score is rather one-sided to indicate the strength, as at times Owen Sound played fine combination. About half a dozen players were ruled off by Referee Brown Jackson, of Seaford, a strict and impartial official, who lined up the teams as follows: DURHAM: Goal—Lavelle; Point—Matheson; Cover Point—McCracken; 1st Defence—Baker; 2nd Defence—Hunter; Centre—Munro; 3rd Home—McCurry; 2nd Home—Lavelle; Outside Home—McIntyre; Inside Home—Gagnon; Field Captain—Dr. Holt; Time Keeper—Davidson. OWEN SOUND: Goal—Thompson; Point—Muir; Cover Point—McCracken; 1st Defence—Cummings; 2nd Defence—Quessell; Centre—Hammond; 3rd Home—Bennett; 2nd Home—McLean; 1st Home—Martin; Outside Home—Gavin; Inside Home—Began; Time Keeper—Morrison; Umpire—Brandon. The game, though billed to start at 3.30, did not commence until 4.15. Five minutes after the whistle sounded, A. McIntyre shot the rubber into the net, scoring Durham's first goal. Owen Sound did their best playing in the first two quarters and although they did not score in the first, they kept the Durham boys down to one goal. In the second, Durham scored three more goals in succession in about six minutes, Owen Sound quickly following with two more, the only goals they got during the game. Lavelle in goal for Durham had a snap, especially with 'Pete' Matheson at point, who played an excellent game and saved the goal many times. Before one minute was played in the third quarter, Durham notched their fifth goal. A. McIntyre, having secured the ball, hit the board at the top of the net, and bouncing back, the ball landed in D. Munro's stick, who shot. McIntyre added another goal for Durham in the third, and the first one in the fourth quarter. Durham added 2 more in the fourth, making the score 9 to 2 in its favor. NOTES: D. Munro and A. McIntyre play a fine combination and assisted materially in jilling up the score. Jimmy Lavelle worked like a Trojan. George Booth, of Hanover, put up a good game. He improved as the game progressed, and excited applause by his brilliant catches. He wonder Owen Sound scored only two goals with a defence like Matheson, Theobald, McCracken, Baker and glass. Hunter makes a good centre man. The new men, Baker and McCurry, are an improvement to the team. A tendency to "scrap" was shown. The lace and the small of it was in evidence in front of Owen Sound goal. Mr. Geo. Mitchell, of the Hanover Post staff, was an interested spectator. Owen Sound Intermediates were trimmed on their own grounds by Mt. Forest last Friday by a score of 5 to 3. The Lobes have improved their team greatly since last season and have a good chance of capturing the trophy. CRICKET IN DURHAM.
