## COUNTY COUNCIL.

June Session held in Markdale

In accordance with resolution of

adjournment from January session, the

County Council of the County of Grey

met in Marsh's Hall, Markdale, on

Monday, the 15th inst. The members

were all present excepting Mr Doyle,

who was detained owing to the serious

illness of his father. The Warden took

the chair at 2 p.m., and after the roll

was called and the minutes of last day

of January session had been read and

signed, he briefly addressed the

Council. He said he had attended

council meetings in the past when there

were vacant chairs, owing to removals

by the hand of death, but he was

pleased that this time there were no

vacancies from this cause, but all were

able to be in their places through the

ordering of a kind Providence. He

congratulated the Council on the fair

prospect of a good crop; also upon the

satisfactory progress being made upon

the work of the erection of the House

of Refuge. He judged that the County

officials having charge of the work had

faithfully done their duty. Important

business would be laid before the

Council at this session, particularly

the equalization of the County assess-

ment. From what he knew of the

gentlemen who compose the council, he

was satisfied they would do what they

considered would be for the best

interests of the County, giving their

best thought and attention to the

business which would be brought

before them.

The Clerk presented and read the

following documents, which were

severally referred by the Warden to

the standing committees to which they

respectively belonged, as noted :

County Treasurer's estimates for 1904

showing that the sum of \$39,000 would

be required to be levied, being \$8,000

in excess of the estimates of last year,

largely owing to the expense in con-

nexion with the erection and main-

tenance of the House of Refuge, bridges,

etc. On motion of Messrs. Gordon and

Paterson, Messrs. Pringle, Bell, the

Warden, the Clerk and the mover were

appointed to draft a letter of sympathy

to the widow and family of the late

respected Judge Creaser.

Messrs. Gordon and McKinnon moved

that the House of Refuge Committee

report at as early a date as possible

the advisability of appointing an

overseer, matron and inspector for

the House of Refuge at this session of

the County Council.

Mr Allan presented Report No. 1 of

Audit Committee, which was on motion

adopted.

Mr W. J. Shortill, Reeve of Markdale,

was introduced, and welcomed the

County Council to Markdale,

tendering them the "freedom of the

city." His address was well received by

the council by the Warden and

the Clerk.
