### SAUGEEN PRESBYTERY & GUILDS MEET IN HOLSTEIN.

At the meeting of Presbytery on Tuesday, Mr John G. Reid, in the absence of the moderator, presided. Rey Mr Aull was absent as he starts to-day, for the old country, and Rev. Mr. McCulloch had found the prairie breezes so sweet that he had not returned.

A deputation from Mt. Forest asked liberty to make an exchange of part of their church property to secure a better shaped lot for building a manse and also the Presbytery's authority to raise by mortgage a sum not exceeding \$3000 to help to clear the cost of building. The requests were granted and the satisfaction of Presbytery expressed at the step the congregation is taking.

Reports on Finance and Y. P. Societies were presented by Messrs. Hanna and Little respectively. The conveners of the standing committees for the current year are as follows:
