A man dressed as an ordinary workman and with ordinary features was placed in a room by himself. Classes of girls of different ages were sent through the room. All that the teacher told them was that they were to go into the room through one door and out through another. When they returned to their classrooms they were asked to describe the man in the room.

Nearly 80 per cent, of the girls confined their attention to the man's clothes; the others described both clothes and features. The same experiments when tried with the boys revealed the fact that nearly 70 per cent. of them confined their attention to the man's features, the remainder to both features and clothes.
