THE DEATH ROLL.—Of the pioneers keeps on increasing, the latest to join the silent majority being Mrs. Jno. Clark, Sr., of 3rd Con., Bentinck, near Aberdeen. A FLOWING WELL.

No little excitement has prevailed in town for a week back over the operations of the Durham Gas and Oil Co., who, at the depth of nearly 200 feet have struck a flowing well of pure and sparkling water, which seems to increase as the days go by. A stream is flowing from it almost as thick as a man's body, and it is thought will rise when piped up to 40 or 50 feet. The occasion of the meeting was the ordaining of Mr. Acheson to the pastoral charge of Latona and Rocky Saugeen. Every part of the service was in perfect taste, every part added impressiveness to the whole, but the moment of deepest solemnity was when the Presbytery laid hands on Mr. Acheson thus in the name of the only King and Head of the Church solemnly devoting him to the work of ministering.

Owen Sound the Victors.

Durham Loses the 2nd League Match. Score, 9 to 2.

On the pleasure grounds, Owen Sound Durham lost the second match played in this district, of the Junior Series, C. L. A., last Monday. By a provision of the C. L. A. rules, Owen Sound played their Intermediate team, which has improved greatly by the addition of outsiders practising, since Mount Forest trimmed them on their own grounds. Durham had much the same team as in the last match but felt the loss of Wes. Theobald, who was unavoidably absent.

Though the score was 9 to 2—the same the Durham boys defied their opponents here, it was hardly a criterion of the play. The spectators got their money's worth in witnessing a fast, clean game of lacrosse, faster than could be expected considering the condition of the grounds, which was made worse by a terrific down-pour of rain in the early part of the game, much slipping being the result. The visitors' light and speedy team kept the home team moving at a fast clip but weight and better combination counted against them.

The home team scored the first goal in 1 minute after the face-off, J. Lavelle trying the score. The Owen Sound aggregation managed to secure 3 more goals in the 1st, 1 in the 2nd, 3 in the 3rd and Durham another and one in the 4th quarter. C. Lavelle in goal for Durham deserves special mention for the manner in which he disposed of most of the shots rained upon him. Also shot made in a reclining position after falling, which resulted in a goal. Referee Kearns gave good satisfaction, what little rulings he had to give being strict and impartial, and two O. S. players were the only adorners of the fence during the game.
