THE POPE IS DEAD.

After a two-week's struggle with the last enemy, Death has conquered, and Leo XIII takes his place in the long roll of over 200 Popes, having outlived them all as to age, and outstriking them all but one, his predecessor, Pius IX. The death struggle was prolonged without a doubt, by the iron will of the patient, whose mentality never dropped into senility, as is common in age. He knew too he was being obeyed by all the world. He died on Monday at 4.01 p. m., and was in his 94th year.

NON-SMOKERS IN THE CABINET.—The recent parliamentary discussion of the cigarette question brought out the fact that the following members of the Dominion Cabinet do not use the weed in any form: Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Messrs. Fielding, Mulock, Scott, Fisher, Fitzpatrick, Cartwright, and the late Minister of Public Works, Mr. Tarte. Hon. HARD ON LORD SALISBURY.—A joke on this venerable statesman has been thought good enough to be cabled to the New York Sun. At the King's Levee last week, the Bishop of London approached and greeted him, but was mortified to find Lord Salisbury did not know him. The Bishop was forced to explain, reminding him that in 1891, he, Lord S., had appointed him to his position. The Bishop later, was lamenting to the King Lord Salisbury's weakness, when His Majesty laughed heartily and said: "He has treated me worse than that. Not long ago, while having an audience with me, he gave a beautiful example of thinking aloud. On a table close to his Lordship stood a photograph of myself. Lord Salisbury, taking it up, gazed at it for a few moments and then remarked, 'Poor old duffer! I wonder if he is as stupid as he looks?'"

THE ELECTRIC RAILWAY.—One of the new promoters of the Huron Ontario Electric Railway was in town Friday. This was Mr. Sawyer of Montreal. He started in at Flesherton to drive over the route, with the view of acquainting himself with the business possibilities of the district, and the probability of being able to secure water power. He was accompanied from Flesherton to Hanover by Mr. Gilbert McKechnie of Durham and as Mr. McKechnie is an enthusiastic advocate of the railway, it may be assumed that everything favorable to the proposal was duly pointed out. Anyway by the time Mr. Sawyer reached Walkerton, he had about made up his mind that the railway would be a good thing, that was business enough in sight to make it pay and plenty of water privileges along the route to run it. He expressed himself as being delighted with the appearance of the country. Indeed, he had come up here expecting to encounter a semi-wilderness and was consequently not prepared for the revelation which awaited him. From Walkerton, Mr. Sawyer left to home, but will be back in a few days to do further investigations. If he decide to go on with the work he must sign the contract not later than the first of September.—Telegraph.

—The King and Queen left on Monday for a tour of Ireland with every expectation of a loyal reception, even though Dublin council cheerfully refused to pass an address of welcome. The decorations are being planned on a lavish scale and the whole empire will be pleased if the royal visit should accomplish a cementing of the emerald isle to its big sister which is greatly needed. King Edward bids fair to be remembered as the "peacemaker." His recent visit to Portugal, Italy and France was decidedly pacific, and the return visit by the French President has been concluded under the happiest auspices. This Irish visit is conceived in the same spirit and all will hope that the results will show that royalty has uses apart from Legislative or governmental functions.

The Toronto Exhibition authorities have abolished horse racing and have substituted an open air horse show pure and simple. There will be trials of speed but only for judging purposes. Points will be allowed for neatness of costume on the part of the driver. All the classes in the Exhibition horse show are open to the world.
