### BENTINCK COUNCIL.

Met at Dornoch, on Monday the 3rd August inst. Members all present. Minutes of Court of Revision and Meeting of Council on 27th May read and passed.

The following By-Laws were duly passed:—No. 5, imposing the following rates, township 3 mills, county 2 1/2 mills and general school 2 mills on \$.

No. 6, imposing the several rates asked for by school trustees, No. 7, appointing Dan McDougall collector and No. 8 allowing the Durham Cemetery Co. to lay water pipes to the cemetery.

The reeve reported having expended \$63.00 in the repair of bridges since last meeting.

The road Commissioners reported the following amounts expended on roads since last meeting, in Div. No. 1, \$150.02; No. 2, \$201.20; No. 3, \$283.34; No. 4, \$278.96 and on Grader Account in Divisions Nos. 1 and 2, \$95.71.

An additional grant in roads of \$50 to each of the Road Divisions was passed.

The following accounts were ordered to be paid:—On smallpox account Dr Taylor, M. H. O., \$80, Jas Walker \$30 and John Schilling \$4.50 attending on Parties isolated, Malcolm Campbell \$2.50 for placarding. The clerk was instructed to notify heads of families who had smallpox to pay their share of the cost of attendance if able to do so.

Chas Meyer was paid \$8.10 for making 73 rods of wire fence and Geo Hendry \$10.00 for 801 rds; John Patterson fence viewer was paid \$2.00 for inspecting the same; Municipal World \$1.65 Collector's Roll and \$1.88 for pathmasters lists; John Patterson, \$6.02 for repairs paid by him for grader; Shewell & Lenahan \$12, part expense burying Mrs Potter; the account of Frank Shields, of butter said to have been destroyed by him in case of infection was not entertained; account from Glenelg Council for repairs on Garafraza Road not entertained; John Bierworth Sr. was refunded \$1.00 overcharge in Statute Labor; the clerk was instructed to bill Sawyer & Massey for repairs done to grader.

Council adjourned to meet at Elmwood on 12th October next.

### TOPICS OF THE WEEK

The great event of the political world last week was the Premier's introduction of the measure looking towards the building of the G. T. Pacific railway which he describes as a political and commercial necessity. The speech, one of his best efforts, was lucid in the extreme. It contained so much that was incontrovertible, that opposition was cowed for a time, but we notice criticism is taking shape of one kind or another. One complains of too much oratory, another of wilful deception, another of failing powers, another that it should be all a government work, &c., &c. We give elsewhere some extracts from the speech.

The King and Queen after having visited Ireland on all sides and in the centre, have gone home. Splendid enthusiasm greeted them every where. No message from an English King ever gave such delight. Well Done Ireland!

The closing paragraph of Laurier's great speech was as follows: "The Canadian Confederation would have been a union on paper and a union on paper only, but for the fact that the G. T. R., the C. P. R. and the I. C. K. brought all parts of our country together in union to pulsate with one and the same heart. This new railway will be another link in that chain.

It will not only open territory hitherto idle and unprofitable; it will not only force Canadian trade into Canadian channels; it will not only create citizenship between old Canada and new Canada, but it will secure for us our commercial independence, and it will forever make us free from the bondage of the bonding privilege.

For that reason alone, in my estimation, it would be worth all the sacrifices, and far more than we are called upon to make. Sir, it is therefore with a firm heart that I offer this scheme to friend and foe; it is with a firm heart that I present it to the Canadian people. I am well aware that it will not be received everywhere with the same feeling; I am well aware that it may scare the timid and frighten the irresolute, but, sir, I claim that every one who has in his bosom a stout Canadian heart, will welcome it as a scheme worthy of this young nation, for whom a heavy task has no terrors, and which young nation has the strength to face grave duties and grave responsibilities.

I beg to move, sir, seconded by Sir Richard Cartwright, for leave to introduce a bill to provide for the construction of a national transcontinental railway."
