**TOPICS OF THE WEEK**

The yacht races on Lake Ontario for the Canada Cup began on Saturday last between the two boats Strathcona, the defender, and Irondequoit, the challenger. The Canadian boat, the Strathcona, won the first heat by only 22 seconds in a very exciting race.

The Dowager-Empress of China seems to be the embodiment of ancient savagery. She has just executed an editor, of the modern party, and has ordered others in Shanghai to be delivered up to her—not for trial—but for death. To the glory of Britain, she seems to be the only nation that has instructed its representative to refuse to give the Reform editor up to the she-wolf of China; the others have acquiesced. At recent examinations, students who referred favorably to reform movements in China were all plucked, and may stand in danger of their lives.

Trade with Britain shows month by month gratifying increases, and so does the volume of emigration. Not that more people are leaving the islands than before, but the tide is being directed to Canada, and fewer go to the States and Australia.

A great Conservative Convention is being held in Toronto, to-day, Wednesday, with both Dominion and Provincial leaders on hand. Mr R R Gamey is not on the bill, but is expected to be there.

Two shots were fired by an anarchist at the French premier while returning from a banquet, but no one was hurt. The assassin was captured.

Russia, while aggrandizing in the east, is threatened with trouble among the laboring classes at home. Japan may see in this an opportunity.
