EGREMONT COUNCIL.

Council met Sept. 14th. Minutes approved.

Robb-Gordon—That I Traynor's account for surveying and assisting amounting to \$18.50 be paid. Carried.

Com'r McIntyre reported: H Haw, tile culvert, \$3; ditching and replacing culvert, \$3; removing grader 2.75, drawing tile 3.00, road impa 8.75; A McDouald, road impa, Glensig townline, half cost, 12.00; John G Orchard, furnishing and delivering timber, Kirkness bridge, \$28.

Gordon-McFadden—That report be adopted and Com'r be paid \$2 com fees. Carried.

Com'r Robb reported—Jas Brown, underbrushing, lot 6, con 14, \$5; John Sinclair, covering and widening approaches to bridge, lot 13, con 14, rep. bridge, lot 18, con 14, rep bridge, 15th sideroad, con 12, 18, \$8.00; G M Reid, filling hole, lot 4, con 12, 1.00; John Hunter, tile culvert G. A., con 10, 2.00; Eurie Bros., 2 extra posts at railing, Loug Swamp, 60c; D Hunter, rep. bridge, lot 10, con 10, 1.00; W Aberdeen, operating grader, 1 day, 1.75. The old timber was sold at Naismith's and Holstein bridge for \$1.50.

McIntyre-McFadden—That report be adopted and Com'r be paid \$3 fees. Carried.

Com'r's Gordon and McQueen as a committee reported on the completion of approaches to Ferguson's bridge, con 5, cost \$99 by O R Evans; also filling hole on road \$2.

McFadden-McIntyre—That report be adopted and Com'r Gordon be paid \$5 and McQueen \$8 com fees. Carried.

Com'r McFadden reported consulting with Manager Cement Co. regarding removal of fences and sign posts on public highway in Egremont, which has to be attended to; fees allowed Com'r \$2; also tile culvert, lot 18, con 2, by David Gordon, 5.00; Thos Benwick, graveling lot 10, con 18, 18.60; fees 3.00. Com'r was notified to meet Normanby Com'r at Varny, Sept 6th, regarding rebuilding and repairing sidewalks in Varny. He attended the meeting, but expressed his disapproval of taking any part in the matter.
