J. S. Coombs, B. A. Hanover, spoke on "Nature Study," an opportune paper in view of the importance given to the subject in the new curriculum.

Mr. R. Thompson gave a most interesting paper on "The History of the Union Jack" showing the growth of its component parts, the incidents surrounding their combination, and the proper dimensions, etc., for construction.

Mr. Rowe, Markdale, illustrated his method of teaching Geography by laying much stress on imparting ideas before words.

Mr. Boyd gave an excellent paper on "Beautifying School Grounds." Parents trustees and children should be all interested in this work.

Mr. Eastman gave a carefully prepared paper on "Recreation." He showed how much attention the ancients paid to it and the great benefits of today's children to secure their hearty cooperation for beautiful grounds have an elevating influence on the minds of pupils.

A paper by Inspector Campbell was deferred for the second time. The Inspector, however, throughout the sessions gives valuable assistance, and his growing experience in technical and academical points is of great value to the association.

TEACHERS' IN SESSION.

(Continued from page 1.)

One of the brightest, certainly the raciest paper of the session was "Teachers' Discouragements and Encouragements" by W. L. Dixon also an old standby of the association. He had arranged the title of his topic, on the sound educative principle of going from the known to the unknown, and he advised them to take their discouragements as the man told the barber who asked him how he wanted his hair cut—silently.

In a humorously sarcastic vein he pictured the easy time a teacher had sitting looking at the school running itself. Absentees, low salary, the pupil who won't be taught, and unattainable ideals held out before them were among the commonest discouragements, while Conventions, Educational papers, sure pay and long holidays were on the other side.

An interesting discussion followed this excellent paper and the trend of the criticism showed things were not so pronouncedly dark as the paper implied.

Rev. Mr. Farquharson, though not on the program, had been asked by the executive to give an address. He complied and put the association under a debt of gratitude by an able and thoughtful address. "The Imaginative Faculty of the mind was shown to be of first importance to the teacher, being the great spring of human activity and one of the chief sources of human improvement, if properly cultivated and directed."

All good teaching is the active use of the imagination; all bad teaching is the perverted use of the same. Teachers who can not get pupils to draw on their imagination, or who neglect its culture, must prove to be failures.
