DR. LANDERKIN'S FUNERAL

Wednesday of last week the mortal remains of Hon. Senator Landerkin were laid to rest in the family plot in Hanover cemetery, a little over a mile from the village of which he has long been the leading citizen. As was to be expected there was a vast concourse of people there, it seemed as if he had called his friends together for the last time to pay tribute to his worth. And they were there from many parts of the riding, and far beyond it. Not only political friends but political foes were there to look on his features once more, who had often rejoiced over them in victory yet never gloated offensively at their defeat. It would be difficult to estimate the thousands there: the procession practically extended from the village to the cemetery, and many horses were never taken from the stable. From last week's "Post," we learn that telegrams of condolence were received from Premier Laurier who, addressing Mr. George Landerkin, said: "Please convey to your mother and family my very sincere condolence in your bereavement. I have personally lost a very dear friend." Hon. G. W. Ross, Premier of Ontario, on behalf of the Liberal members of the House of Commons, M. K. Richardson, M. P., and about a dozen other parliamentarians all telegraphed condolences, while many came from private sources. The funeral offerings were very numerous, the most striking being a Masonic one, and in addition to those on the coffin, a special conveyance took the numerous others to the grave. The government was represented by Senator Templeman, the Senate by Senators McMullen, Watson and Jones, the Commons by five members, chief among whom was a warm bosom friend, who was twice in the riding to give friendly help, D. C. Fraser, of Guysboro, N. S. The others were Messrs. Campbell, of York, W. S. Calvert, Col. Thomson and Tolmie. The pall-bearers from the house were D. Knechtel, H. H. Miller, J. H. Adams, Duncan Campbell, R. Gowanlock and A. Wenger. Dr. Ross, of Walkerton and Rev's Budge, Bray and Garner, of Hanover conducted the obsequies. The Masonic pall-bearers were Mickle, of Chesley; Bishop, O Sound; Dr Wilson, Tara; J. J. Telford, Durham; D. McNicol, Bentinck and H. Clarke, Walkerton. The Grand Secy. of the order Hugh Murray, Hamilton was also present and assisted W. M. John Mills, of Hanover, at the very impressive Masonic ceremony at the grave. There was a weird solemnity to the interment as each in turn placed a few shovelful of earth on their departed brother, the lowering sky and sprinkling rain seeming to harmonize with the occasion. From Durham there were Dr Gun and Messrs G McKechnie, R MacFarlane Fr, J P Telford, John Hunter, T Harris, Jas J Smith, O Ramage, Mr Geo Binnie, Bussessan, Mr Jas Murdoch, Holstein, and many others who had stood side by side with him in many conflicts, were there. We also noticed present Mr R E Miller and Mr B Allan, ex-M. P., Owen Sound. Hanover of course had but one thought that day. Business places, factories and schools were closed and flags were at half mast. The general mourning was increased by the death about the same time of three prominent citizens, Mr J W Stone, Mrs McGeagh, and Mr Geo Brown a well-known Bentinck pioneer and father-in-law of Mr M Jackson.
