TOPICS OF THE WEEK

—John Alexander Dowie, or "Elijah Second" as he calls himself, has a new movement on hand, nothing less than to regenerate New York city. He, with a few thousand Zionites, are there now. They have a wonderful organization 500 officers, a choir of 500 and with preaching, singing and house to house visitation they hope to convert Gotham.

—Canadian trade is reported in a remarkably healthy condition. Large orders are coming from the west.

—A dastardly attempt has been made by Chinese to blow up the whole British Legation in Pekin. A battery and concealed wires leading to the magazine were discovered in time.

—Mr Gladstone at Leeds in 1881 said: We read in the Scriptures "if thine enemy smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him also the left." But the protectionist puts it "if thine enemy smite thee on thy right cheek smite thyself on the left." This view is well illustrated in Canada at present. The surtax placed by Canada on German goods in retaliation for the withdrawal of favored nation treatment, has to be paid, it is found, by Canadian consumers, nothing of the same class being available here. Much the same result is seen in England, where sugar bounties granted to assist the West Indies, has resulted in destroying a home trade in jams, jellies and other sweet products. Taxes imposed other than for revenue purposes have always a tendency to act like the boomerang, they appeal to a selfish instinct which is not likely to result in good to the masses. The apparent success of United States protection results largely from the fact that there is a vast internal area all under free trade, but even there the system has made possible the organization of large and dangerous "trusts" and "combines."

—The lamented death of Senator Landerkin has left a vacancy in the Senate that will doubtless be filled by some one from Western Ontario, and we think no more fitting appointment could be made than Mr Benjamin Allan, ex-M. P., of Owen Sound. Mr Allan is one of the old war-horses who have done valiant work for the Reform party and good work for the country. He won North Grey against great odds and at great sacrifice to himself, and is moreover an able business man of large experience and of excellent reputation. He is still vigorous and in the Senate would do excellent work.

THE ALASKA AWARD.

As was feared from the first, and especially since the United States Commissioners practically announced their determination not to yield their points, the Canadian contention as to the Alaska boundary has been over-ruled, Lord Alverstone, the British Commissioner, siding with the Americans. Canada gets one small point, control of the Portland canal, but that which Canada most desired, an ocean port tributary to the Klondyke, is denied her.

This closes the question for ever, but there will be a hot spot under the vest of thousands of Canadians at what will seem to them a sacrifice of rights for the sake of amity with the republic.

The Canadian commissioners, Jete and Aylesworth, refused to sign and left the room before the others signed, and this manly protest undoubtedly receives the sanction of Canada. There is a certain satisfaction however that the thing is settled.

CAMPAIGN LITERATURE.

The slime of the coming political campaign is beginning to flow. We have been reminded of this by the receipt from Ottawa of a Conservative campaign sheet, enclosed in a sealed envelope, and franked thru the mails by the stamp of M. K. Richardson, M. P. Tons and tons of this material were shipped to the Conservative whip at Ottawa from Montreal, and from Ottawa it is circulated over the Dominion, postage free. The loss to the postal revenue alone by this practice on this occasion, is estimated by the 'News' to be about \$400,000.00. The Liberals, perhaps, are doing it also, though we have seen none of theirs as yet.

The practice is utterly bad and we are surprised that Sir Wm Mulock has not discovered in this practice a means whereby his surplus would have been largely increased.

The cartoons, the scare headings, the clap trap and one-sided statements of campaign literature deceive but few, though if the organizers think it right they are at perfect liberty to publish it. What is wrong is making the country carry the stuff through the mails free, while honest correspondence and reputable literature must pay postage.
