

ITALIAN GARDEN MAGIC.

To Find Its Secret, Study the Garden in Relation to the House.

Some of those who have fallen under the spell are inclined to ascribe the Italian garden-magic to the fact of time; but, wonder-working as this undoubtedly is, it leaves many beauties unaccounted for. To seek the answer one must go deeper; the garden must be studied in relation to the house, and both in relation to the landscape. The garden of the Middle Ages, the garden one sees in the medieval illuminations and in early woodcuts, was a mere patch of ground within the castle precincts, where "amplies" were grown around a central well-head, and fruit was espaliered against the walls. But in the rapid flowering of Italian civilization the castle walls were soon thrown down, and the garden expanded, taking in the fish-pond, the bowling green, the rose arbor, and the clipped walks. The Italian country house, especially in the centre and south of Italy, was almost always built on a hillside, and one day the architect looked forth from the terrace of his villa, and saw that, in his survey of the garden, the inclosing landscape was naturally included; the two formed a part of the same composition.

The recognition of this fact was the first step in the development of the great garden-art of the Renaissance; the next was the architect's discovery of the means by which nature and art might be fused in his picture. He had now three problems to deal with: his garden must be adapted to the architectural lines of the house it adjoined; it must be adapted to the requirements of the inmates of the house, in the sense of providing shady walks, sunny bowling-green, pastures, or orchards, all conveniently accessible; and, lastly, it must be adapted to the landscape around it. At no time and in no country has this triple problem been so successfully dealt with as in the treatment of the Italian country house from the beginning of the sixteenth to the end of the eighteenth century; and in the blending of different elements, the subtle transition from the fixed and regular lines of art to the shifting and irregular lines of nature, and, lastly, in the essential convenience and livableness of the garden, the fundamental secret of the Italian garden-magic. The anthracite trade began with an output of 1,965 tons in twelve months. It has grown to 70,000,000 tons annually. In 1803 the city of Philadelphia bought 100 tons of anthracite for use in the pumping works, but the engineers, not knowing how to burn it, broke it up to gravel to walk in the yards. In 1814 two arkhons were sold at the falls of the Schuylkill for \$21 a ton. A morning was wasted in futile attempts to burn this coal, and at noon the employer and his workmen, discouraged at their ill-luck, shut up the furnace and went to dinner. On their return they were astonished to find a roaring fire, the furnace doors red hot and the furnace itself in danger of melting. From that day dates the successful use of anthracite in America.

U. S. Immigration.

Of the total of 857,046 immigrants into the United States in the last fiscal year, Europe contributed 814,707. Northern and Western Europe, including the German empire, Switzerland, France, Belgium, Netherlands, Denmark, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Norway and Sweden, contributed 233,889 immigrants last year, against 138,700 for the previous year. The increase of 94,989, or 47 per cent. Southern and Eastern Europe, including Austria-Hungary, Italy, Greece, Roumania, the Russian empire and Finland, Spain, Portugal, Serbia, Bulgaria, Montenegro and Turkey, contributed 610,813 last year, against 480,331 for the previous year, an increase of 130,482, or but 27 per cent.

The German press reports that a new vocation has been found for women on account of the use of Roentgen rays (X-rays) in the hospitals. Courses of lectures for the instruction of X-ray nurses will soon be commenced at Berlin. These women will only serve as nurses of patients treated by X-rays, and as assistants at the use of them, which service is of a very delicate nature and requiring great care.

The Russian Canal. When the proposed great waterway across Russia from the Baltic to the Black Sea is completed, it will be one of the largest canals in the world. It will start from Riga, and end at Cleron, near the Crimea, a distance of 1,607 kilometres, or about 1,000 miles. Its average depth will be twenty-six feet. Some of the most important towns of Central Russia will be connected, and large steamers and war vessels will be enabled to pass through the very heart of Russia.

An American syndicate has declared itself ready to undertake this work and complete it in five years at a cost of \$162,500,000. The construction of such a network of canals would make Russia the country best served with inland waterways in Europe.
