Obituary.

The friends and relatives, in the vicinity of Durham and Bentinck, will be grieved to hear of the sad and sudden death of John Campbell, Spencer, Colorado. Mr. Campbell has for several years been interested in the mining industry of that place, being the owner of several valuable claims. It was while at work in one of these, on Thursday, Oct. 22nd, that he met death. Coming to the surface some of the shaft, a distance of fifty feet, to the bottom of the mine. The funeral services were held in the Presbyterian Church, of Spencer, Mr. Campbell being a communicant of that denomination. The deceased was a son of the late Duncan Campbell of Bentinck. He was born in Scotland, May 6th, 1844, and came with his parents to Canada in 1845. His earlier days were spent in Bentinck. In 1880 he married and moved west the same year. By industry and perseverance Mr. Campbell accumulated property. The deceased leaves a widow and four children, two sisters and a brother to mourn the loss of a loving husband, father and brother.

TOPICS OF THE WEEK

C. E. MISSIONARY FOR SAUGEEN PRESBYTERY.

At the June meeting of the Presbyterian Convention, at Holstein, a committee was appointed, D. L. Campbell, Drumore, convener to ascertain if our C. E. Societies in Saugeen Presbytery could support a missionary. As sufficient has been promised to support a Home Missionary viz., \$250, but not enough to maintain a Foreign Missionary, the committee decided to ask Dr. McLaren to appoint us a Home Missionary.

This was done on Oct. 31st last, when there was a meeting of the field of Mekeewabey in the Presbytery of Portage la Prairie, under charge of Rev. A. M. McQuarrie, who will furnish us at least two reports from the field during the year. These reports will be sent to all societies in the Presbytery to be read. All the societies will send their contributions, half by end of year and half by end of June to the convener, D. L. CAMPBELL, Drumore.

THE LATE DUNCAN McMILLAN.

[The following sketch of the above greatly respected gentleman is furnished us by our Boothville correspondent and makes an appropriate addition to last week's notice.—Ed.]

One of the pioneers of Proton, Mr. Duncan McMillan died on Sat., Oct. 31st, 1903, aged 83 years. The funeral took place from his late residence on Monday, Nov. 2nd, to St. Andrew's Church, Swinton Park and was probably the largest ever seen in these parts. Mr. McMillan was well known and highly respected. His consistent walk was a power for great good in the township and beyond its bounds. Ever fearless in upholding what he believed to be right and in condemning what he believed to be wrong he made lasting impressions upon the people who came in contact with him. Powerful in bodily frame, strong in character, conscientious to the very letter and possessing intellectual qualities far above the average, he was a type of man not always met. To see him was to admire him, to know him was to love him. He was a staunch supporter of the Presbyterian Church and an elder in St. Andrew's, Swinton Park, where he will be sorely missed. Over forty years ago he started the first Sunday School in Proton, nor did his interest in work for the young ever weaken. He was the ministers' great ally, always stood with them in their difficulties, cheered, counselled, helped, and it was fitting that so many of them, Rev. Mr. Morrison, Cedarville; Rev. Mr. Matheson, Priceville; Rev. Mr. Roach, of Mekeewabey; and Rev. Mr. Campbell, of Drumore, took part in the funeral services. Mr. Morrison, his former pastor and Mr. Matheson spoke very appropriate words, the latter from the text "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God."
