It will never be definitely known just what caused the explosion, as the lips of the two men who could throw light on the matter sealed forever. Experts affirm that the accident was probably due to the familiar cause. Through some defect in the pump the water ran low in the boiler, while the steam pressure increased. When the cold water from the pump struck the super-heated steam it acted like a lighted torch to a gas well. The imprisoned energy broke from its steel cell, snapping the heavy plates like so many pipe stems. The thick brick walls were crambled into ruins, shaftings and pufleys three companion boilers, each weighing 25,000 lbs., were tossed a distance of 60 feet, as if they had been so many feathers. On every hand was to be seen mute evidence of the terrific force of steam.

Terrific Force of Explosion. The four big boilers which supplied were bricked and stayed together. It was No. 3 that exploded. The huge boiler parted in the middle, the seem that the boiler whirled around like a corkstrow. Boilers Nos. 1 and 2 were furied to the east of the engine house, while No. 4 was thrown to the west about 60 leet, grashing through the three-foot thick wall which divided the engine room from the machine shop, with as much ease as a knife cutting through paper.

The boilers were all 100 power, and were 14 feet long by 6feet in diameter. They each weighed 25,000 lbs., and were manufactur-ed by Goldie & McCulloch. The boiler which caused the wreck had been in commission six years. The boilers were inspected once a month, and just two weeks ago all four were inspected by the expert for the insurance company, and pronounced in splendid condition.
