THE SAUGEN PRESBYTERY.

The Presbytery of Saugen met at Harrison on Tuesday, Rev Mr Cameron, in the absence of the moderator, in the chair. The call from Cedarville to Mr Barbour was dropped, Mr Barbour having sisted proceedings by notifying the congregation that he would not accept of it. Some discussion took place over the rise of Presbytery and Synod rates during the last two years for which the extra levy by the Synod is largely responsible, but after full consideration the higher rate was decided to be necessary. Rev Mr McVicu from Ferguson, in the interests of Foreign Missions, made a plea for friends to assist the mission band in maintaining and training the 1200 native orphans, who are placed under their care through the stress of famine and plague in Indore, Central India. The presbytery approved of the mission and commended it to the liberality of the congregations within the bound.

Considerable interest was taken in a paper by Rev Mr Farquharson on Prof McFaden's book "The Criticism of the Old Testament and the Christian Church." Mr Farquharson did not so much review the book as discuss the problem it presents. After lysing low a number of fallacies in the professor's reasoning he concluded as follows: "What are we to do with the problem?" Prof McFaden's book is an earnest attempt to face it. The book may be faulty, its logic may have its lapses, its opinions may be unfounded, if you will, throw it aside as having failed in its task, but when you have thrown the book aside, you have not got rid of the difficulties it presents. The facts and conditions which Modern Criticism raises may be disturbing to our minds, they may force us anew to think out the questions we had been accustomed to think our fathers had settled for ever, but whether pleasing or displeasing, these difficulties are God's gift to the church of today. Our title and power hang on our honestly seeking the light through them. Cast no stones, then, at the Professor's attempt, however imperfect. Rather live anew the spirit of the noble Ximenes, Cardinal Archbishop, of Toledo, who when his editor Stunica sought to depreciate the Edition of the New Testament which Erasmus had hastily issued, replied: "Would God that all the Lord's people were prophets! Produce better if thou canst; condemn not the industry of another."
