GLENELG COUNCIL.

The council met December 15th, as per statute. Members present. Thomas McFadden, reeve, Messrs Davis, Kerney and Arrowsmith, councillors. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Accounts were read from the Municipal World with several gravel accounts.

Davis—Kerney—That cheques issue in favor of the several boards of School Trustees for the amounts of General and Section School rates amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$4420.95. Car.

Davis—Arrowsmith—That D McFadden be paid \$1.50 for work at lots 49 & 50, 3 E. G. R. (special). Carried.

Davis—Arrowsmith—That Jos Arkison be paid \$1.75 for gravel for division No. 19. Carried.

Davis—Kerney—That the report of the Local Board of Health be adopted, and that the members thereof be paid a further sum of \$3.00 each. Carried.

Kerney—Arrowsmith—That Geo Roy and Henry Clayburn be paid \$12 each for charity for the six months ending Dec 31, and that Jas McGillivray be paid \$12 for keep of Mary McArthur up to Dec 31, and that Thos Dunn be paid \$10 for keep of Mrs Furness for July and August. Carried.

Kerney—Arrowsmith—That A Black be paid \$4 for repair of culvert at lot 48, con 3, N. D. R. Carried.

Arrowsmith—Davis—That the Municipal World be paid \$7.75 for municipal forms for elections. Carried.

Arrowsmith—Kerney—That Frank Haley be paid \$4 for work at lot 20, con 8, (Statute Labor Fund). Carried.

Davis—Kerney—That John McGrath be paid \$3.25 for dry wood for hall and Joseph Neil be paid \$1.75 for Cedar for hall. Carried.

Arrowsmith—Kerney—That Commissioner for ward 2 be paid \$6.72 balance of his commission. Carried.

By-law No 455 appointing polling places, and deputy Returning Officers was passed.

Davis—Kerney—That the clerk be paid \$5, balance of salary, 10.00 for preparing minutes for publication and 2.18 for postage and express charges. Carried.

Kerney—Arrowsmith—That the treasurer be paid \$1.90 for Bank draft and postage, Wm Kerney 2.00 for committee work. The reeve and Mr Davis 1.00 each for committee work, and Archie McLean 1.40 for gravel. Carried.

The reeve having left the chair, the same was taken by Mr Davis, when it was moved by Mr Kerney, seconded by Mr Arrowsmith.

That the thanks of this council is due and are hereby tendered to Mr Thomas McFadden, reeve, for the kind, intelligent and gentlemanly manner in which he has presided over the deliberations of this council during the year that is now drawing to a close. As we have found in him always a ready and willing assistant in both work and advice for the welfare of the township. Carried unanimously.

EGREMONT COUNCIL.

Council met Dec 15. Minutes sustained. Com'r Gordon reported rep. Kelley's bridge by Wm Jordan, cost \$2.25.

McFadden—Robb—That report be adopted and Com'r receive 50 cts com fees. Carried.

Com'r Robb reported road jobs as follows:—Wm Reid, raising bridge lot 16, con 14, \$5; do railing and rep. bridge on 16th sideline, con 12-13, 10.00; do rep. culvert, lot 9, con 14, 2.00; do, rep culvert lot 5, con 14, 75 cts. Total \$17.75; Thos Bunton, tile culvert, lots sideline, con 13-14, 2.00; Jos Hunter, filling hole approach to bridge 5th sideline, con 8-9, 75 cts.

Gordon—McFadden—That foregoing report be adopted and Com'r receive \$1.50 com fees. Carried.

Com'r McQueen and Gordon reported on Dreyer's bridge as follows:—Superstructure is satisfactorily completed except painting which committee thought advisable to defer till spring and recommended that \$25 be withheld out of contract price \$525 till completed. Abutments are satisfactorily completed, and recommended that C Kirk be paid in full viz \$16 and \$12.50 additional for renewing old abutments.

The approaches were let to A Young for \$47, which are nearly completed and recommended that he be paid \$4, and remainder when completed.

Robb—McFadden—That report on Dreyer's bridge be adopted and Com'r receive \$5 each, com fees. Carried.

Com'r McQueen reported road imp: Duncan Kennedy, culvert, lot 2, con 4, \$2; J Wilson, two pieces of lumber, covering for culvert 25th sideline \$1; Jos Bentley, graveling E and P townline, opposite con 11, 20.00; H Culp, graveling on E & P townline, con 11-12, \$14.

McFadden—McIntyre—That foregoing report be adopted and Com'r receive \$3 com fees. Carried.

Com'r McFadden reported cutting hill, lot 3, con 20, by W Hunter, cost \$15.

Robb—Gordon—That foregoing report be adopted and Com'r receive \$1.50 com fees. Carried.

By-law No 164 for holding Municipal Elections passed the usual readings, &c.

Com'r McQueen reported on grant on E & P townline:—R Hunter, gravelled 80 rds on E & P townline for which \$30 is recommended, and there still remains \$60 of the \$125 grant to be spent on said townline between Cedarville and Conn, which he was unable to get the work done.

Robb—McFadden—That report on said grant be adopted and Com'r be paid \$1 com fees. Carried.

Com'r McIntyre reported as follows: Arthur Wilson finishing ditch, con 2, 50 cts; Wm Hay, placing support under bridge, con 19, 50 cts. Also reported on a grant of \$15 made in 1902 to ent and improve Wilson's hill, lot 9, con 20, but said contract is not yet completed and recommended that \$11 be paid on account to Jno McBeth the contractor.

Robb—Gordon—That foregoing report

be adopted and Com'r receive \$2 com fees. Carried.

McIntyre—McFadden—That W Hastie be paid \$5 as bal of salary as assessor for 1903. Carried.

McIntyre—Gordon—That the Financial Statement as now read and prepared by the reeve and treasurer be accepted and finally passed and we get 200 copies printed at the Chronicle office, Durham. Car.

McFadden—McIntyre—That the reeve be paid \$2 for making out Financial Statement for 1903. Carried.

Resolved that the following account be paid:—Geo Freeman, flour Mrs Barclay, \$9.60; Dr Brown and Mrs Kerr \$5; J Waddell, goods Mrs Barclay \$5; J H Brown do \$6; Municipal World Election supplies \$7.80; A Mitchell, express charges 45 cts; Clerk's quarter salary 35.00; do 1 yr, postage and stationery 5.00; Jas Eccles, gravel \$7.75; Joe Campbell do 1.25; Geo Haw, do 75 cts; Geo Manary do 3.40; W Pride do 2.25; A Gilles, rep grader 1.50; J A McEachern, rep scraper 25 cts; J D Roberts, reps to grader, &c, 1.90; do rent for hall, council room 1.50; C Drummond, account for spikes, Nainith's bridge 1.28.

Robb—Gordon—That the reeve vacate the chair and Mr McFadden take the same. Carried.

Resolved that the thanks of this council be now tendered to Mr McQueen, reeve, for his gentlemanly conduct, kind and efficient manner in which he has discharged his duties as reeve during the year now drawing to a close. Mr McQueen made a very touching reply. Council rose.
