If the charcoal is at all hard to get, its place is taken almost as well by sods or earth rich in humus. It is questionable, indeed, if there is anything better than seds or vegetable mold taken from the wood lot. Ground bone, wood ashes, soft coal oid mortar, rotten wood, etc., are also among the substances used and recommended for this purpose. It is quite evident that corn meal, salt and water do not supply all the elements essential to building a normal framework of bone and muscle.

Spraying is necessary and three times is sufficient-once before the buds open, again after the blossoms fall and once again in two weeks. The most Convenient time to prune is in April.

The tree then is just beginning its growth and the wound will soon heal.

Mr Shearer, who spoke on "Breeding and Feeding Hogs for Profit. 'said that the three breeds, Berkshire, Yorkshire and Tamworth, or their crosses, produce the largest proportion of the best type of bacon hogs. In selecting broud sow always choose her from a large litter, and see that she has twelve or fourteen good teats. He prefers to have her of a lengthy type rather than the short, blocky brand, heavy joins and with as light shoulders as possible. He explained how an additional ration could be supplied the young pigs by having a place for them to feed while still suckling the mother. Castrate the male pigs when 4 or 5 weeks old. Do not wean till 8 or 10 weeks old. By feeding a mixture of 1 bushel of oats, & bus of barley, and a few pounds of flaxseed ground finely, with pulp mangles, and milk he is able to produce the bacon hog at about 3 to 4 cents a pound live weight. He also feeds condiment to keep the digestion sweet and clean, 1 bag of charcoal, & barrel wood ashes, and a pail of salt thoroughly mixed. Feed a little twice a week. To produce these results requires a warm pen and plenty of clean bedding in winter.
