COUNTY COUNCIL

Continued from last week.

FRIDAY MORNING

The council met on Friday morning accordance with the resolution of adjournment on Wednesday forenoon. The meeting was held in the town council chamber. The members were all present but Mr Doyle.

After the warden had signed the minutes of previous meeting, Messrs Smith and Stewart of Meaford who were present addressed the council asking for a grant of \$50 to the funds of the Meaford and County of Grey Poultry Association.

The clerk presented the following documents among others. Report of H. H. Burgess, inspector of Public Schools for West Grey; report of N. W. Campbell, inspector of public schools for South Grey; draft of memorial from counties of Stormont, Dundas, and LeGleny, asking the Legislature to amend the Act respecting petit juries; application of C. A. Fleming to be appointed a county auditor; letter of county treasurer in reference to amendment of by-law respecting auctioneers license; application of R. Agnew to be appointed a county auditor; written application from Meaford and County of Grey Poultry Association for grant; application from A. F. Armstrong to be appointed a county auditor; statement from Governor Miller of aid given to discharged prisoners; also accounts from R. P. Butchart & Bros., \$52.65; Christie Bros., \$39.91; and other smaller accounts from W. Kennedy & Sons; R. Breckeuridge & Son, J. W. Reifern, W. H. Taylor, J. C. Kennedy, D. McLean, the McCallum Co., A. McEachern, Charles Irwin and others.

Mr James McLaughlin addressed the council with reference to a grant to the General and Marine Hospital.

Mr Thompson presented his first report of the Finance Committee and Mr Gordon presented the first report of the County Property Committee. Both reports were adopted without discussion.

The Clerk read his report of tenders received for coal supplies.

By-laws were introduced for the appointment of county auditors, two members of the Judicial Board of Audit, a trustee for the Owen Sound Collegiate Institute, and a trustee for the Meaford High School. These by-laws were respectfully numbered 648, 749, 056, and 651.

After second reading of the above by-laws the council adjourned until Friday evening at 7 o'clock.

FRIDAY EVENING.

At this session a few accounts were presented and an application from M. B. Flynn of Ayrton, to be permitted to tender for the county printing.

Mr Gordon presented report of the House of Refuge Building Committee, which recommended as follows (1) Your committee would recommend that the keeper and matron of the house of refuge and industrial farm be installed in their respective positions and that they occupy three rooms on the second floor of the house of refuge as agreed upon between your committee and the contractor, Mr Richards, and also that they have possession of the three rooms known as the keeper's rooms, as soon as it is possible for the contractor to finish the said rooms; (2) that the salaries of the said keeper and matron are to commence and to date from the first day of February, 1904; (3) that the chairman be and is hereby authorized to engage the county solicitor to prepare an agreement or other instrument binding the contractor in such a manner that the occupancy of the said rooms by the keeper and matron do not in anywise vitiate or annul the provisions of his contract for the erection and completion of the house of refuge; (4) that the necessary steps be taken to procure a team of horses for the industrial farm by the chairman and keeper of the house of refuge, as near as may be the team to be between four and six years of age, bay color preferred, price not to exceed \$500 if possible, weight about 1200 lbs., and what may be described as a good heavy team; respecting the purchase of the said team the conditions in general way, to be that before they are finally purchased the said team is to pass a satisfactory trial as to soundness, work etc., and to pass the inspection of a properly qualified veterinary surgeon as to soundness, said veterinary surgeon to be required to give a certificate to that effect; when said team is located the chairman and keeper and councillor living nearest the point of purchase are hereby authorized to complete the purchase and issue an order on the treasurer for the amount of the purchase price; (5) that the keeper be and is hereby authorized to purchase a suitable cow or cows for the industrial farm as soon as he can take care of them.

The above report was adopted without discussion.

The clerk read a by-law of the town of Durham to authorize the issue of debentures for the sum of \$4,000 to cover cost of building a bridge over the Saugeen river in Durham. Mr A. S. Hunter, mayor of Durham, addressed the council asking that these debentures be given the benefit of the county guarantee.

Council went into committee on By-laws 648, 649, 650 and 651, Mr Paterson in the chair. The by-laws were filled up with the names of C. A. Fleming and R. Agnew as auditors; Jas Allan and Jas Cochrane as members of the Judicial Board of Audit; Jas McLaughlin as trustee of the Collegiate Institute and E. Y. Godfrey as trustee of the Meaford High School.

On motion of Messrs Bell and McArthur a committee was appointed composed of Messrs Garity, Thomson, Schenk, McLean, and the mover, to examine into the sufficiency of the treasurer's receipts and report thereon.

Council adjourned until Saturday at 2 o'clock p. m.
