

GEORGE SKENE SR.

On the morning of the 18th inst., the tall familiar form of George Skene Sr. of Latona, lay cold in death. The bright smile which during life was wont to light up his clear cut features, was still there, but the heart that always bespoke heartiness lay motionless over the noble, sympathetic, but now, silent heart.

Mr. Skene claimed the land of the heather as his birthplace, being born in the parish of Kincardine, O'Neil on the 28th day of October, 1820.
