A SKETCH OF GLENELG TOWNSHIP, PAST AND PRESENT

Continued from several weeks ago.
Council for 1866: James Edge, reeve; John Humphrey, John Travers, Francis Walker and Samuel B. Chaffey. As all the Council were elected in wards the Reeve and Deputy were chosen by the Council themselves. James Edge was appointed reeve and S. B. Chaffey, deputy reeve. J. W. McDonell and Arch McKeen were appointed auditors, Wm Morrison, Assessor. John Barnet, tavern inspector. (Mr. Barnet was father of Mrs. Arrowsmith, of Durham); John McCormick, collector.

The following claims were paid for sheep killed by dogs:—Hugh McKay \$87.75, John Kelly 7.90, Jas. Waddie 11.00, John Caswell 5.00, Wm Armstrong 18.00, John McCarty 10.00, Dan McCarty 2.00, John Carson 12.50, Jas. Edgingham 9.00, Wm. H. Routhugh 15.00, Mrs. Cameron 4.00. These \$318.15, the above amounts to be paid out of dog tax fund.

Council for 1867:—Jas. Edge, reeve; J. Humphrey, deputy reeve; John Travers, Francis Walker and Hugh McFayden, councillors; McDonell and McKeen, auditors; John Barnet, tavern inspector; Jas. McGirr, assessor. A by-law was introduced to raise the sum of \$30,000 worth of stock in the Grey and Sincere Railway and the reeve and deputy reeve were requested to use every exertion to forward said project. By-law was passed.

The following figures show tax levied for the different purposes intended for, from the year 1860 to 1870, showing the rate levied in each year. The gravel road being built in the year 1860 caused a heavy rate to be levied for that purpose for 20 years.

In adding the amounts for each year we find it to be forty thousand four hundred and six dollars raised in 12 yrs. the years 1861 & 1868 being the highest, but we find the difference chiefly in the County rates for said years.

Council for 1868 same as previous year; auditors McDonell and McKeen; John Barnet, tavern inspector. Tenders were received for the office of assessor for 1868 as follows:—John Stottbart \$75.00, John McDonald \$60.00, Jay McGirr \$5.00, Jno. McKeehan \$5.00. The tender of John McKeehan was accepted being the lowest. John McCormick was appointed collector for 1868 at the rate of 3 per cent on all monies collected by him.

Council for 1869:—Jas. Edge, reeve; John Humphrey, deputy reeve; Hugh McFayden, Francis Walker, John Travers, councillors; J. W. McDonell, Arch McKeen, auditors; Jas. McGirr, Assessor. A communication from Dr. Ghent and Wm. Ferguson Esq., local Superintendent, from section No. 12, Arternesia, praying to have part of section No. 2 Glenelg united with 12 Arternesia laid on the table for further consideration.

The following motion is on record moved by Mr. Travers, seconded by Mr. Humphrey:—That pathmasters attention be called to the fact that several parties in the Township are placing stones on the roads and in many places fences are on the roads also, causing inconvenience to the public and that parties guilty of doing so, have said obstructions removed. Lots of stones and fences put on the roads since. The above motion was passed.

A petition was presented by Chas. McQueen, an old gentleman in his day, asking the council to grant him the sum of \$100 to defray his expenses across the Atlantic, back to the land of his nativity. It was moved by Mr. Lumprey and seconded by Mr. Travers that the above petition be not granted. Carried. The old gentleman was removed without a petition a year or two afterwards to the world beyond and all the good council of Glenelg granted him was \$2 to pay his way to Bruce County.

Special meeting of council held at the Argyle Hotel, Hotel, Durham, on Nov. 23rd, 1869, for the purpose of taking into consideration bylaw, authorizing the issue of debentures to the amount of \$44,000, to aid the construction of a railway from Huron to the village of Durham in this township. The bylaw was entertained by the council. Bylaw \$3 for the purpose of taking a vote on the granting of \$44,000 and fixing voting places, were passed. The following gentlemen were returning officers:—Jas. Brown, Durham ward; Arch Black, No. 2 ward; Center ward at Percy's Mill, Finlay McRae; West electoral division, Chaffey's Mill, Jno. McCormick; North electoral division, Sam Donnelly. By-law was ordered to be published in the Durham Chronicle for four consecutive weeks and the vote be taken thereon on Dec. 17th, 1869. Carried.

Council for 1870:—Jas. Edge, reeve; Jno. Humphrey, deputy reeve; Jas. Lander, John Travers and John McDonald, councillors; J. W. McDonell and A. McKeen were appointed auditors; Christopher Williams, tavern inspector and Sam Donnelly assessor. Special meeting was called by the reeve for the purpose of appointing an assessor instead of Mr. Donnelly, who resigned the office. Wm. Morrison was appointed at a salary of \$65 per annum. The tavern inspector handed in his report recommending the following parties for certificates for tavern licenses, viz: Jno. Scott, Arch McLenn, Jno. Good, Jas. Spence, Hugh McKay, Henry Cole, Alex. Bartleside, Don McInnes, Robt. Turnbull and H. J. Middaugh. The report was approved of by the council.

A petition was presented by the trustees of Union S. S. No. 12, Arternesia and No. 2, Glenelg, asking the council to pass a bylaw to enable them to raise the sum of \$250 on the Glenelg portion of section No. 2 for the purpose of building a school for the purpose of building a school house. The petition was laid over for further consideration. The sum of \$200 was granted for the improvement of the Lambton St. The Reeve, Adam Cochran, S. E. Legate and John Kelly were appointed a committee to have the same laid out to the best advantage. Carried. The prayer of the petition of the trustees of S. S. No. 12, Arternesia and No. 2, Glenelg was granted, authorizing them to levy the sum of \$150.55 in two yearly levies for the erection of a school house

IS DANCING INJURIOUS TO HEALTH AND RELIGION.

Dancing is so common now-a-days that some think it their duty to attend to all the sports and parties inside of 20 miles. In the land of our forefathers it was customary in some places to have the next place a ball was to be held, given out at the preceding place. Now, I am not going to say that the iniquities of the forefathers have followed their children down to us, but I can say that their manner and custom in that respect are not forgotten by them. It is good to imitate our ancestors, in as far as it complies with the rules of leading the youth on the way that terminates to higher and nobler deeds.

Now let me point out by the way a few of the evils that are associated by attending balls, dances or whatever name it may assume. Suppose that we leave out the injury that attending the habit referred to, does to our religion and confine our remarks on the injury to health. I say it is injurious to health and let me point out my proofs for saying so. Young men in the habit, during winter time more especially, of attending woodchests and such like and a party is given at night for to pay them for the good work done all day and if they worked hard swinging their arms all night during daytime they work far harder all night tramping the floor and oftentimes when in a state of perspiration from being over-heated when performing the exercises engaged in, young men and ladies have caught the pure air to cool them off, which has done me more instances by the means of contracting a cold that may ultimately bring them to a premature grave.

I am not one of those that think that dancing is an evil far above all other amusements, but I am one that is a firm believer that by attending continually places of this nature that has a tendency to draw away the minds of those indulging therein from attending to matters relating to a nobler character, viz. the attending of church ordinances. Every person knows that every Sunday for the last two months was a stormy one, and very few made any attempt of going to church, but as the case might be on the following Monday night, a "ball" or "dance" was to be held in some place or other and no matter how stormy the night was or how deep the snow the next day she attended a ball or dance and she attended as usual and she would go to no more, but next she said she attended as well as the first for the desire seemed to be getting stronger in proportion to the frequent attendance. But there are those who do not attend any of the places I have made reference to and they seem to enjoy themselves in a different manner by attending other kind of amusements. If I have made any remarks that are out of the way I will thankfully stand correction.
